2017 ROTARY AGAINST MALARIA CONFERENCE

Rotarians and Rotaractors alike attended the 2017 RAM Conference, hosted in Sydney. Among others, speakers included Ben Rickie Kiokimo (Solomon Islands Ministry of Health), Associate Professor Harin Karunajeewa (Walter and Eliza Hall Institute) and Dr Danielle Staniscic (Griffith University).

“Of the many Rotary gatherings and conferences I attend, I find the RAM Conference the most stimulating and intellectually challenging, and the event from which I think I take the most away, :Bill Oakley, of the Rotary Club of Carlton, Vic, said. “I think malaria is now close to elimination in many places, like Timor, however, the next 20 years will be critical. I might even live to see the Pacific region free of malaria.

“At this year’s conference, Professor Dennis Shanks (Australian Army Malaria Institute” discussed malaria prevention efforts in places like Taiwan and China, which I found particularly illuminating. Malaria elimination can be achieved with some of the older tools and methods, combined with energy and focus. It does not need to wait for technological breakthrough – though a vaccine is now hopefully forthcoming.”

The 2018 RAM Conference will be held August 25-26 at the Institute for Glycomics at Griffith University, Qld, where PlasProtect r is being developed – likely the very first multi-strain viable vaccine to protect against malaria. The beautiful Gold Coast location is an added bonus. TREE PLANTING DAY—SATURDAY 14TH OCTOBER

Rotary International President Ian H.S. Riseley said at his address to all the 2017—2018 District Governors that protecting the environment and curbing climate change are essential to Rotary's goal of sustainable service. Environmental degradation and global climate change are serious threats to everyone, Ian said. "They are having a disproportionate impact on those who are most vulnerable, those to whom Rotary has the greatest responsibility. Yet environmental issues rarely register on the Rotary agenda". President Ian challenged every Rotary club to make a difference by planting a tree for each of its members between the start of the Rotary year on 1 July and Earth Day on 22 April 2018. Trees remove carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases from the air, which slows global warming. "It is my hope that the result of that effort will be far greater than the environmental benefit that those 1.2 million new trees will bring," Ian said. "I believe the greater result will be a Rotary that recognizes our responsibility not only to the people on our planet, but to the planet itself."

With this in mind our Club and Board agreed to start looking into how we could take up this challenge and 'Make a Difference'. Thank you to Rotarian John Lloyd —Community Service Director that has taken this project on and made contact with Moreton Bay Regional Council to see how we can make this happen. John has been in talks with Nicole Byrne, Environment Officer from the Community & Environment Department. Details as follows:

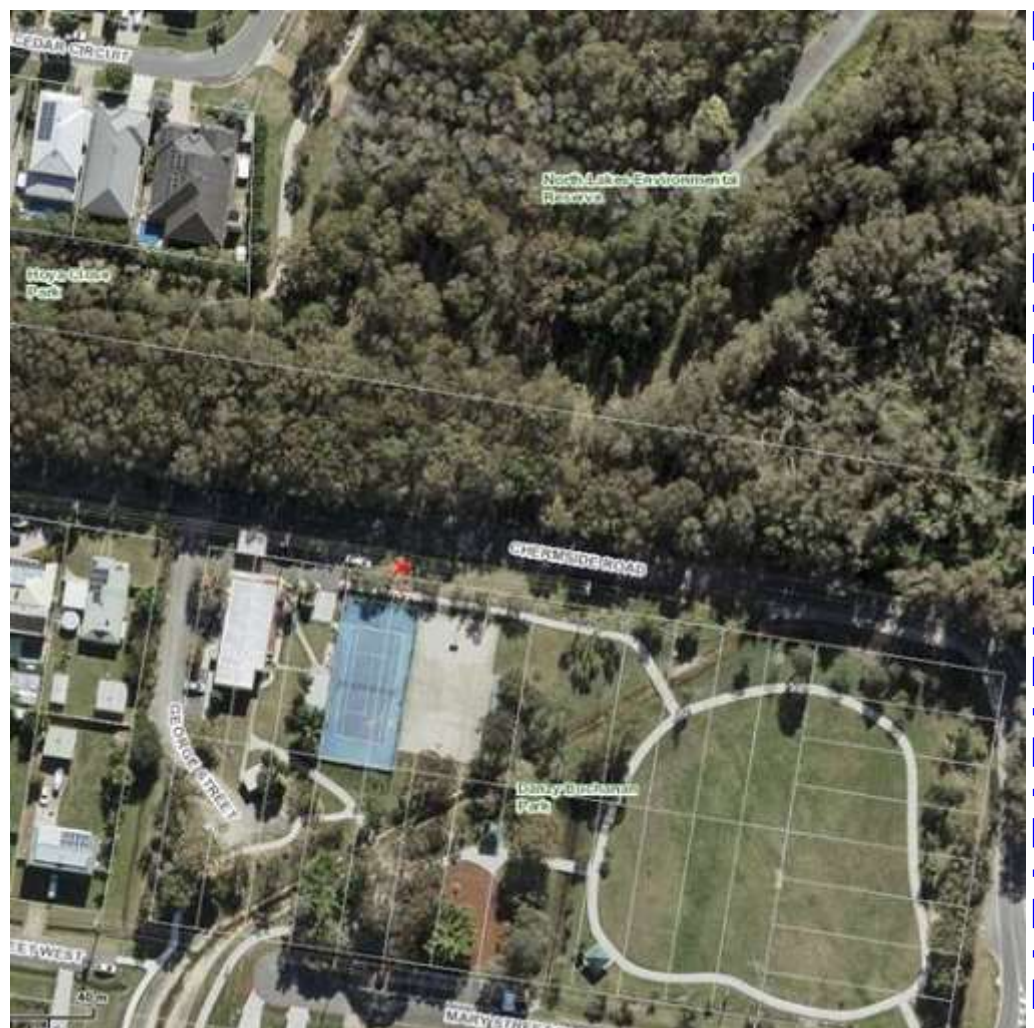

KIPPA-RING

The club derives its name from an Australian aboriginal religious ceremony of making secular boys into sacred men who were then a Kippa.

This ceremony was performed in an area of two circles (or rings) that were to be found locally, hence the name Kippa-Ring.

The name was first approved in 1971 The Queensland Place Names Board has told Redcliffe Council it had noted the first approach for the establishment of a new school came from the Kippa-Ring Progress Association and while the name of the district was approved by the Board, it would prefer to see the name spelt "Kippa-Ring" in order to preserve the connotation with the aboriginal ceremony from which the name is derived.

Pat Gee, author of "Redcliffe - Looking at the Landscape" and noted local historian describes fully the origins and use of the suburbs name. Among other notes, she points out that the ring itself disappeared in the 1950s. In 1927 a Dr. Hobbs referred to the area - running across the Kipper Ring flats then over a neck of swampy land to Scarborough.
