Saint Peter said, "OK... You may pass through the Pearly Gates".


The third man started searching desperately through his pockets and finally pulled out a pair of women's panties.



MONTH

Rotary's top priority is the eradication of polio, but our members take on far greater responsibilities to fight disease. They set up health camps and training facilities in undeveloped countries and in communities struggling with HIV/AIDS and malaria. They also design and build the infrastructure for doctors, nurses, governments, and partners to reach the one in six people in the world who can't afford to pay for health care.

Disease prevention and treatment takes on many forms, from supporting studies to helping immunize people to improving drinking water and the sanitation infrastructure. The world relies on Rotary to tackle these global challenges, and to set an example for others to follow.







INDOOR RIDE TO END POLIO AUSTRALASIA



Rotarians Riding so Others May Walk

Ride to End Polio - an event staged in Tuscon, Arizona; which has contributed over \$13.5M to the End Polio campaign... However, since travelling to the USA to participate can be expensive; organisers came up with an alternative – teams got together and raised some sponsors at \$1 minute.. they all hopped on an exercise bike and pedalled to End Polio...

Indoor Ride to End Polio

The Ride to End Polio has been conducted as part of the El Tour de Tucson since 2009. The El Tour has been held in Tucson, Arizona for over 31 years, and Rotary's involvement came several years ago as the result of a dedicated Tucson Rotarian cyclist, Mike Harris.

In 2016, the big bike ride was held on Saturday 19th November. The El Tour de Tucson/Ride to End Polio is a one day event, of distances from 107miles (173 klms) 140 Miles (140 klms) 60 miles (97 klms) or 45 miles (72 klms).

In 2015 Rotarians and Friends from around the world raised US\$13.5 million (including the Gates Foundation match), towards the End Polio Now Campaign, and has the fantastic support of our General Secretary, John Hewko.

District 5500 (Arizona) has been the driver of this project, and realising that not everyone in

the Rotary world can get to Tucson to do the ride each year, decided to open up the fundraising ability of Rotarians to be able to support the ride and to support the End Polio Now campaign.



The Indoor Ride to End Polio was able to be done in our local community, AT OUR HOME or GYM.

WE CHOSE THE NUMBER OF MINUTES FOR OUR RIDE and sought sponsorship from our friends and colleagues.

Whether riding for distance or minutes, each rider sought donations in support of our efforts.

Many riders asked for \$1 per minute, however, many had group sessions in gyms or spin classes and asked for a gold coin, or \$5 or \$10 per session.

The dates of participation for the **International Indoor Ride to End Polio** was from the **13th to the 20th of November**, to coincide with the other indoor rides, finishing at the same time as the

road ride is being held. (Arizona Time is 19th)

Supporting the Ride To End Polio ride was one way to show that Rotary's commitment to polio eradication is unwavering, whatever obstacles we face.
