# MAY- Rotary Focus is: Youth Services

Youth Service recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults through leadership development activities, service projects and exchange programs and aims to provide innovative and practical opportunities to assist and motivate young people in our communities to acquire learning and life skills.

Youth Service is an investment in the future. A commitment to Youth Service within and through our Rotary clubs is a commitment to the next generation of potential Rotarians and the ongoing future and health of Rotary in general.

Rotary Clubs constantly engage with young people and this is frequently via schools with which the club has an association. It is usually through these schools that students are sourced or recommended for our many Rotary Youth Service programs. Another means of engaging with young people is via Rotaract, Interact and Earlyact.. as well as our Rotary Youth Exchange and Rotary Youth Leadership Awards programs

ROTARACT is Rotary's service club for young people aged between 18 to 30 years of age. We have 5 Rotaract clubs in our District 9600 cosponsored by a multitude of Rotary clubs. Rotaract clubs conduct community and international service projects, whilst focusing on leadership and professional development. Rotaractors in our District have also assisted at RYLA, RYPEN and INTERACT conferences. *Our Club co-chartered the Rotaract Club of North Lakes*.

INTERACT is Rotary's service club for young people aged between 12 to 18 years of age. These clubs can be school or community based but in our District are school based clubs of which we currently have 28 clubs within our District. Rotary Clubs sponsor Interact clubs and provide them with support and guidance but each Interact Club is self supporting and self governing. The goal of Interact is to develop leadership skills and personal integrity, demonstrating helpfulness and respect for others, understand the value of individual responsibility and hard work and advance international understanding and goodwill. Each club develops their own projects in the local and international community. Our Club chartered the Interact Club at Grace Lutheran College in Rothwell.

EARLYACT is a service club for primary school students sponsored by a local Rotary Club with its mission and operation closely linked to those or Rotary. Involvement in Earlyact teaches values such as caring, respect, responsibility, tolerance, compassion, friendship and leadership. Our District currently has 8 Earlyact clubs.. Our club chartered the club at Hercules Road State School in Kippa Ring.







## Sir Clem Renouf.. A D9600Legend!

**Rotary District 9600** has produced 2 of the 4 Australian Rotary International presidents Glen W. Kinross (Rotary Club of Brisbane) -1997/98 and Sir Clem Renouf (Rotary Club of Nambour)-1978/79

It was Australia's **Sir Clem Renouf** who, as President of Rotary International in 1978 and 1979, led the international campaign to vaccinate every child against polio. As a result of these early efforts by Rotary, the global community came together in 1988 to launch the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

Since 1988, there has been a reduction in the number of polio cases by 99.9 per cent. Following the certification of India as polio-free in 2012, polio remains endemic in only Afghanistan, Pakistan and Nigeria. The world now has polio eradication within its reach. This would be the second disease to be eradicated globally after small pox and a major victory for international aid and public health.

SIR Clem Renouf thinks of himself as an ordinary bloke who, thanks to a life-long liaison with Rotary, got to do an extraordinary thing.

As Rotary prepares to mark another anniversary around the world this Tuesday, the 88-year-old former World War II pilot is unshaken in his belief the world is close to eradicating polio.

And the fact this unassuming accountant, who joined up as Nambour Rotary's foundation secretary 77 years ago, deserves a lot of the credit is one of Australia's best little-known facts.

Sir Clem's campaign has saved untold millions of people from one of the world's most terrible diseases.

The opportunity came to him in July 1978 when he became only the second Australian (at that time) to be elected president of Rotary International... Sir Clem decided it was time for the legion of Rotary clubs around the world to focus less on parochial projects and tackle a big-picture problem that would leave an indelible mark on society.

He had been inspired by the World Health Organisation's eradication of smallpox and came up with Rotary's Health, Hunger and Humanity program that would initially see 6.3 million children immunised against polio in the Philippines at a cost of just \$760,000.

Another offshoot of the project was providing free tetanus vaccines to 390,000 expectant mothers.

Suddenly Sir Clem realised there was a real power for good in the form of the ready-made Rotary network spanning the globe.

"A lot of people say I spearheaded the eradication of polio campaign, but that's not right. I just happened to know the right person to talk to," Sir Clem said. The "right person" was Rotary District Governor Dr John Sever, who was head of infectious diseases at the National Institute of Health in Washington DC. Sir Clem put the question to him – was there another disease that could be eliminated?

He pinpointed polio, which was crippling 1000 people every day while an oral vaccine could be given for about 10 cents a dose.

"I had no idea where that simple question would lead us – others would build on it, none more so than John Severs whose commitment to the goal of eradication has not wavered for more than 30 years," Sir Clem said.

The final blow against polio is now tantalisingly close with Pakistan, Afghanistan, India and Nigeria the only places where people can be crippled by the easily preventable disease.

"I used to say it would be eradicated in the next few years, but it gets harder the closer you get," Sir Clem said. "But I intend to die in a polio-free world."

His eternal optimism comes from the support of people like US philanthropists Bill Gates and Ted Turner, who have poured \$US16 million into the campaign.
