








What a BOLTER!

The back story for this was a fundraising Trivia Night held at the Kippa Ring State School. Jayne Shannon (teacher) had travelled to Nepal a number of times and became involved with the 'Shree Bal vikas Samaj English Medium Basic School'. The Trivia Night raised approximately AUD3,500 to pay for flights for two Nepalese teachers from the school to observe the curriculum delivery at Kippa Ring State school. The R.C. of Kippa Ring-North Lakes had legal oversight of the Trivia Night and assisted Jayne Shannon in the organisation and promotion of the event.


Unfortunately Jayne Shannon's applications for Australian visas for the two Nepalese teachers were rejected. It was then decided that the funds raised should go towards upgrading the school's facilities and this would be determined by the school's principal Dhorje Tamang. The administration of the funds transfer was organised between The R.C. of Kippa Ring-North Lakes and The R.C. of Katmandu Mid-Town.


Guest speaker last week was Jerry Smith (with wife Di)..We learnt a lot about Jerry (our President Elect).

Did you know???

that 80% of maternal deaths could be prevented with access to reproductive health services and trained health care workers? Did you know that women in sub-Saharan Africa face a 1 in 39 lifetime risk of dving of pregnancy- or childbirth-related complications? Did you know that 222 million women who would prefer to delay or avoid childbearing lack access to safe and effective contraception? Did you know that 6.3 million children under the age of five die each year from diseases, malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation? Startling statistics, but we as Rotarians can do something to change those numbers. This Focus Area—Maternal and Child Health—may be more challenging than some of the others because most of us do not have expertise in this area. We need to find and include Rotarians who are trained in maternal and newborn health care, such as midwives, obstetricians, and gynaecologists. We can also partner with local organizations that have expertise in maternal and child health. Of course, our projects in this area need to be sustainable so empowering the local community to take ownership of health training programs is essential.

What can we do? Suggestions from Rotary are numerous, but here are just a few. Provide birthing kits to health professionals. Provide information about and access to contraceptives. Support accredited training programs. Develop or support programs that provide immunizations and antibiotics. Prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission. Promote good nutrition, and finally, include water, sanitation, and hygiene efforts in our projects.


Rotary Clubs around the world dedicate the month of April to making a difference in Maternal & Child Health. We are encouraged to take action in the following areas:

- Develop or support program that provide immunisations and antibiotics. Measles, malaria, pneumonia, AIDS and diarrhoeal diseases are the leading causes of death in children under five.
- Prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission by

- encouraging the use of antiretroviral drugs and formula feeding.
- Promote good nutrition, including encouraging breastfeeding for most infants.
- Include water, sanitation and hygiene efforts to maximise child nutrition.
 Diarrhoeal diseases caused by contaminated water exacerbate malnutrition in children.

The man on the 2 dollar coins name is Gwoya Jungarai and he was one of the only survivors of one of the last recognised massacres of Aboriginal people, the 1928 Coniston Massacre in Central Australia.

Almost every Australian has seen his face , Next time you hold a 2 dollar coin in your hand take a minute to reflect on Gwoya Jungarai.

Gwoya Jungarai is also spelt Gwoya Tjungurrayi or Gwoya Djungarai he was a Walpiri-Anmatyerre man of the Northern Territory of Australia.

The design of the Australian two dollar coin was inspired by a drawing of Tjungurrayi by artist Ainslie Roberts in 1988.

10 Fun facts about the 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games






- The Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games is the fifth time Australia has hosted a Commonwealth Games and GC2018 is the first one ever to be held in a regional Australian city.
- This is the 21st time Australia will compete at a Commonwealth Games. We are one of only six countries who have competed at every Commonwealth Games since they officially began in 1930.
- 'Share the Dream' is the official slogan for the Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games and the mascot is a blue, surfing koala called Borobi. The word 'borobi' is an aboriginal term for koala.
- During the Games, the Gold Coast will welcome over 10,000 athletes, officials and media, from 71 Commonwealth nations and territories.
- The 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games' Queen's Baton Relay is the longest one ever. The baton has travelled through the entire Commonwealth for 388 days and covered a colossal 230,000 kilometres.
- The 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games' emblem is inspired by the Gold Coast landscape and coastline. The colours represent the vibrancy and warmth this year's Games wants to instill in its competitors & visitors.
- Featuring 18 sports and seven para-sports, GC2018 will feature the largest integrated sports program in Commonwealth Games history, and for the first time there'll be an equal number of men's and women's medals awarded at a Commonwealth Games.
- Australia will take a total of 473 athletes to this year's Games with the majority participating in the athletics (109), swimming (70) and cycling (36). This is Australia's 2nd largest Games team ever after Melbourne 2006.
- Aussie swimmers Emma and David McKeon will represent their country at a Commonwealth Games on home soil 36 years after their parents and uncle competed at their own home games! The brother and sister also competed at the Rio Olympics in 2016 and were the first siblings to swim for Australia at an Olympics since 1960.
- At 11 years of age, Wales' Anna Hursey is the youngest person to compete at GC2018. Anna competed in the table tennis.

Dear Rotarian

Through the financial support of Rotary Clubs, Australian Rotary Health has been able to fund successful research to help people live full and productive lives.

The current emphasis on Mental Health research is to help the 20% of Australians who will face a Mental Health issue at some time during their lives. People in our Emergency Services, people we work with, people in our Clubs and Communities - our friends.

Through research grants your donation can help reduce the stigma these people face every day and importantly help them return to productive work and family life.

Following are some dot points briefly describing a few of the achievements of medical research in Australia funded by Australian Rotary Health.

- SIDS The incidence of SIDS (cot death) was reduced by 80%
- Mental Health First Aid a program now used in 22 countries to teach members of the public to recognise symptoms of mental health problems and how to give initial help.
- Cool Kids Program 2 in 10 children experience anxieties, this world renowned program helps children and parents manage their children's fears and worries.
- Motor Neurone Disease A simple urine test has been developed to detect and monitor the progression of motor neurone disease in patients.
- Lung Transplant Program patients are achieving a 95% survival rate after 2 years and the number of deaths while on the waiting list has reduced from 29% to 3%.
- Youth Depression A study has revealed that sleep problems precede depression episodes in adolescents therefore allowing early detection and intervention.
- Pancreatic Cancer A current study has shown significant progress in reducing the growth and spread of pancreatic cancer.
- Diet A recent study showed a link between 'western style' diets and depression. Foods including processed meats, pizza, chips, hamburgers, white bread, sugar, flavoured milk and beer were associated with depression and anxiety.

Your donation not only helps us get closer to effective mental illness treatment and prevention strategies, but as you approach the end of the Rotary Year you can recognise your Club members; board or Community Members who have made significant contributions in your town.

A Certificate and a pin will be sent to the club for each person named a level of Friend and Companions receive a framed certificate and a pin with either a ruby, emerald or diamond chip to recognise their contribution


