Rotarian from England wins 2012-13 Rotary Friendship Exchange Video Contest

A Rotarian from Bramhall, England, won the grand prize in the 2012-13 Rotary Friendship Exchange video contest with an entry describing a Friendship Exchange trip to Uganda.

Sue Preece, along with her husband, Bob Preece, and David Rose, of the Rotary Club of Bramhall & Woodford traveled to western Uganda in January to visit the Rotary Club of Kasese. The two clubs have worked together to improve the lives of poor villagers in the surrounding countryside.

For her video, Preece chose the theme "Make a friend, make an impact: Serving humanity together," one of three contest themes. The video demonstrates how the exchange built warm friendships between members of the clubs and convinced villagers that the Rotarians care about helping them improve their situation for the long term.

"The whole trip was an amazing experience," Preece says in the video. "We learned that Rotary is a way of life in Uganda, and we were very impressed with the projects they tackled."

The three-person team visited the village of Lhuwhawha, which both clubs have supported through a Model Village project, delivering clothing, medicines, mosquito nets, boots, and latex gloves for villagers who work with pigs and chickens. The villagers demonstrated how they were using sewing machines the clubs had previously donated to make school uniforms.

David Rose, a retired surgeon, held a two-day medical clinic that drew 90 patients.

"We were treated like royal guests," Preece says of their welcome by Kasese Rotarians, who roasted a goat in their honor. The local Rotarians also took their guests across the equator to visit the Queen Elizabeth National Park, home to one-quarter of Africa's bird life.

The president and president-elect of the Kasese club plan to visit Bramhall in May. "We just hope we can provide them with an equally exciting time," Preece says.

As the home club of the contest's winner, the Rotary Club of Bramhall & Woodford will receive an engraved award, and Preece's video will be featured on Rotary's [YouTube channel](#), Rotary's [Facebook page](#), and in the [Rotary Service Update](#) newsletter.

Two other entries were selected as contest finalists. A video depicting a February 2013 multiclub exchange between District 5080 (parts of British Columbia, Canada, and parts of Idaho and Washington, USA) and District 3272 (Afghanistan and parts of Pakistan) was selected as the [first runner-up](#). The [second runner-up](#) is a video about an exchange trip to Sri Lanka between District 3050 (parts of India) and District 3220 (Sri Lanka).

The video contest was held to promote [Rotary Friendship Exchanges](#), which offer opportunities to experience other cultures and make lasting friendships. Only Rotarians and their spouses may go on exchanges, but Rotarians can involve the whole family by hosting visiting Rotarians from around the world. Exchanges are organized and sponsored by the participating districts and can last from a few days to a few weeks. Rotarians may embark on individual or team exchanges and may incorporate a service or vocational emphasis into the exchange.

For members of Rotary, Rotary Down Under has over 2,000 subscribers receiving the electronic edition of Rotary Down Under each month.

For convenience, and to demonstrate Rotary's ongoing commitment to environmental sustainability, Rotary Down Under subscriptions can now be ordered and delivered to your inbox directly.

Feedback has been extremely positive and it costs no more. Why not order the electronic edition and give a hard copy edition to your guest speaker, or to your local doctor's surgery or solicitor's waiting room? Some clubs have already taken the decision to take their subscriptions completely online, while maintaining delivery of half a dozen hard copies to give away for public relations purposes.

It is still a condition of your Rotary Membership that you subscribe to an approved Rotary Magazine. However, if you and your life partner/wife/husband/de-facto/significant other or even your Rotarian son or daughter or Rotarian brother or sister live at the same address, you are no longer required to take two or multiple subscriptions.

These are the conditions that must be met:

If you elect to take a digital subscription, you will need to provide us with your email address. Under no circumstances will we pass that information on to any third party.

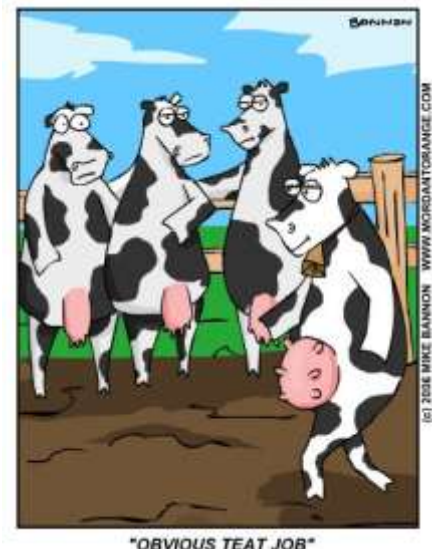
Email traffic from us to you will be limited to delivery of the magazine in the form of link from an email once a month, along with e-newsletters occasionally when important Rotary issues arise, such as disaster relief appeals like the Queensland floods in 2011 or the Christchurch earthquakes.

As subscription to a magazine is a condition of your Rotary membership, we will require advice from your club secretary that you are no longer a Rotarian or that you have taken up a subscription with The Rotarian magazine before we can delete your details from our email database. You will not be allowed to "unsubscribe" from the service unless we hear from your club secretary to the effect already mentioned. If you do try to unsubscribe, we have no choice under the terms of our license with Rotary International but to restore your details to the printed edition database.

The price of an electronic subscription is the same as a hard copy subscription. Apart from the expense of providing and continually updating the software required to keep the electronic services provided by Rotary Down Under, it should be remembered that we are still committed to providing a hard copy to everyone who requires it. This means that while the number of people opting into the electronic version can be expected to gradually increase, thereby diminishing the actual print-run of the hard copy edition, we will still have a significant print-run that will remain in all likelihood for many years to come. We are therefore producing two types of magazine and bearing the cost of two production systems. There will, no doubt, be savings on the production of the hard copy edition in time, but these savings will be more than offset by the cost of keeping technologically up to date.

Our commitment to you is that when we reach a critical mass of digital subscribers, we will adjust the subscription price accordingly.

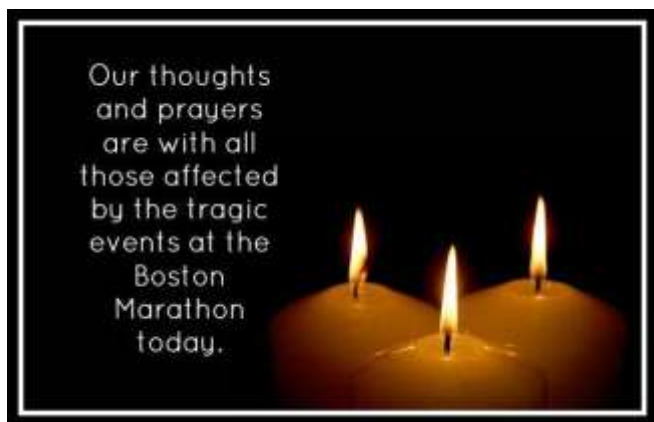

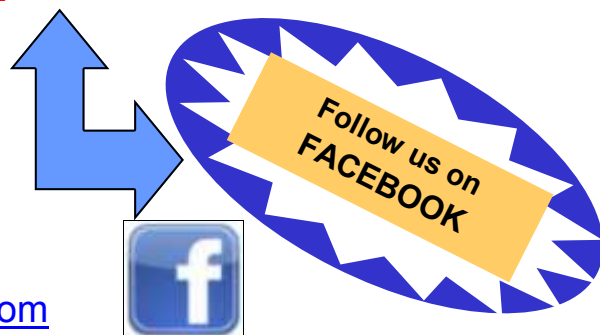

KIPPA-RING

The club derives its name from an Australian aboriginal religious ceremony of making secular boys into sacred men who were then a Kippa.

This ceremony was performed in an area of two circles (or rings) that were to be found locally, hence the name Kippa-Ring.

The name was first approved in 1971 The Queensland Place Names Board has told Redcliffe Council it had noted the first approach for the establishment of a new school came from the Kippa-Ring Progress Association and while the name of the district was approved by the Board, it would prefer to see the name spelt "Kippa-Ring" in order to preserve the connotation with the aboriginal ceremony from which the name is derived.

Pat Gee, author of "Redcliffe - Looking at the Landscape" and noted local historian describes fully the origins and use of the suburbs name. Among other notes, she points out that the ring itself disappeared in the 1950s. In 1927 a Dr. Hobbs referred to the area - running across the Kipper Ring flats then over a neck of swampy land to Scarborough.
