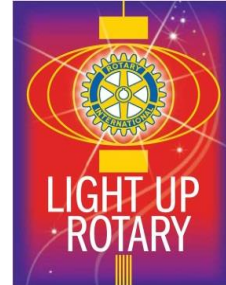

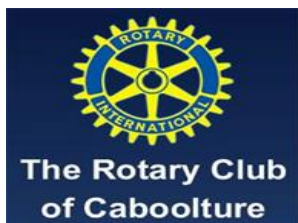
Luciano Pavarotti, was an Italian operatic tenor who also crossed over into popular music, eventually becoming one of the most commercially successful tenors of all time. He made numerous recordings of complete operas and individual arias, gaining worldwide fame for the brilliance and beauty of his tone—especially into the upper register—and eventually established himself as one of the finest tenors of the 20th century.

As one of the Three Tenors, Pavarotti became well known for his televised concerts and media appearances. From the beginning of his professional career as a tenor in 1961 in Italy to his final performance of "Nessun dorma" at the 2006 Winter Olympics in Turin. Pavarotti was at his best in bel canto operas, pre-Aida Verdi roles, and Puccini works such as La bohème, Tosca, and Madama Butterfly. Pavarotti was also noted for his charity work on behalf of refugees and the Red Cross, amongst others. He died from pancreatic cancer on 6 September 2007. *(Luciano Pavarotti was a Rotarian -Rotary Club of Modena, Italy)*

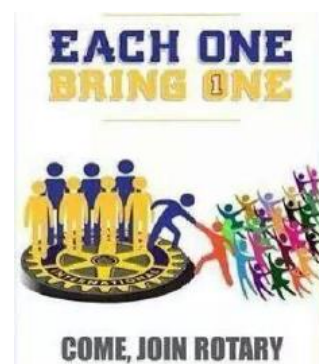

Lighting up Rotary, now and then

At the age of 13, I attended my first Rotary International Convention, in Dallas, Texas. I remember walking through the halls of the event fascinated by the clothing worn by some of the women — women of Africa in their head wraps and ornate dresses and women from India in beautiful wraps of silk.

Although I don't remember all of the Rotary occasions I have attended as a child, I am blessed that my grandfather joined Rotary, which led to my father becoming a Rotarian. I grew up in the halls of Rotary meetings, district conferences, and fundraisers. I joined Rotary at the age of 29.

When I'm asked when I became a Rotarian, my answer is, "I don't really know." Rotary has always been a way of life for me, it's part of what defines me. Rotary has offered me opportunities that I would not have had in a single career path in a typical workplace. It has given me connections and friendships that I never could have dreamed up.

And just this week I was reviewing my grandmother's scrapbooks of my grandfather's Rotary career (she compiled wonderful scrapbooks before we knew to call it "scrapbooking"). In the pages, I found something else that I never could've dreamed up. Thirty-five years ago, my grandfather was starting his year as a district governor with the RI theme "Let Service Light the Way." Now I start the year as district governor to "Light Up Rotary."

TELLING YOUR STORY

“When you share simple stories of everyday people, it’s amazing the impact you can have,” says Eve Claxton, a StoryCorps producer.

Everyone has a story to tell; learn how to share yours



In an age of information overload, a compelling personal story can be the most effective way to get your message across.

As a Rotary leader, you may think you don’t have a story. But everyone has a story to tell. Since the beginning of human history, stories have been used to share information and convey wisdom. If you speak from the heart, you can tap into your innate ability to tell a story. The secret is knowing that your story matters.

Recently, representatives from National Public Radio’s **StoryCorps**, which has collected and archived more than 45,000 interviews with nearly 90,000 participants, gave a presentation to regional coordinators in which they identified three major categories of stories that matter:



STORIES OF CHALLENGE — You’re faced with a series of difficulties to overcome.

STORIES OF CONNECTION — You come into contact with someone and you’re changed as a result.

STORIES OF INGENUITY — You’re faced with a problem and find a new and ingenious way of solving it.

If your story fits one of these categories, you probably have a story to share. By communicating Rotary stories through your club or district’s websites, social media, newsletters, and media in your community, you can energize others and help potential members better understand and relate to Rotary.

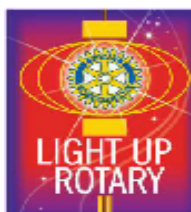


HERE ARE A FEW TIPS FROM STORYCORPS TO GET YOU THINKING ABOUT A STORY TO SHARE:

- 1 **Listen for stories everywhere:** around the water cooler, during meetings, in conversations with other Rotary members and in your community.
- 2 **Keep your ear open for stories about individuals.** Stories of organizations simply lack the same power as a personal story.
- 3 **Make a habit of keeping a personal story bank.** You can collect and store stories using the video or audio functions of your phone, but an old-fashioned notebook and pen work just as well.
- 4 **As you prepare your story, ask yourself these questions:** Is the story rooted in a specific time and place? Who is the story about? What is the tension point in the story? Is there a moment when something unexpected or challenging happens that breaks the normal pattern of things?
- 5 **Be sure to show how perspectives have changed.** What things are different at the end of the story from the way they were at the beginning?
