The *Rotary movement came to Iceland* in 1934 when RC Reykjavík, Rótarýklúbbur Reykjavíkur, was established. At first Iceland was part of a District in Denmark but since 1946 it is a separate District, number 1360.

Today there are 28 Rotary clubs in Iceland with about 1200 members. Iceland has one Rotarian for every 266 inhabitants which is among the highest, if not the highest per capita in the world. Eighteen of the clubs in Iceland have evening meetings, eight have lunch meetings and two have breakfast meetings.


The value of volunteering is deeper, much more fulfilling and much more important in contributing to a healthy and vibrant community than money can ever measure.




