



Originally called Armistice Day, this day commemorated the end of the hostilities for the Great War (World War I), the signing of the armistice, which occurred on **11 November 1918—the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.** Armistice Day was observed by the Allies as a way of remembering those who died, especially soldiers with 'no known grave'.

On the first anniversary of the armistice, in 1919, one minute's silence was instituted as part of the main commemorative ceremony. In London, in 1920, the commemoration was given added significance with the return of the remains of an unknown soldier from the battlefields of the Western Front.

The Flanders poppy became accepted throughout the allied nations as the flower of remembrance to be worn on Armistice Day. The red poppies were among the first plants that sprouted from the devastation of the battlefields of northern France and Belgium. 'Soldiers' folklore had it that the poppies were vivid red from having been nurtured in ground drenched with the blood of their comrades'.

After the end of World War II in 1945, the Australian and British governments changed the name to **Remembrance Day** as an appropriate title for a day which would commemorate all war dead.



## Sharing Project Information Sparks Ideas

# Shaping the future and inspiring others

Last year Rotary International raised and spent more than \$300 million on Aid and Community projects throughout the world. This point was highlighted at a recent Rotary Conference in Caboolture Queensland. When you think about it on a global scale, the service of



individuals, is having an amazing impact when we work together. We are literally transforming the world and shaping the future of many, through the projects we implement today.

Over the last 100 years, Rotary has had a positive impact on the lives of millions, either through being members of Rotary, or those who are recipients of their service, via local and international projects. Rotary Clubs from the other side of the world, are assisting communities in our neighbouring countries, where we are conducting our own community projects. But are we able to assist our sister clubs who are working on projects right next to us?

Even in our tightly connected and data rich world, we often have difficulty in finding the information we need. In many cases it really is problematic, getting the right information or even knowing where to look for data on specific projects or areas. Many Rotary clubs have completed projects in various parts of the world and continue to do so today. Funds are raised, research completed, contacts are

## Share your project info with other clubs

By simply filling out an online form with information about your current and past projects and placing a marker on a map, you will assist other Rotary clubs with future projects.

The map at the base of the form allows users to zoom in to see individual buildings and place a marker with good level of accuracy. The recorded point is immediately saved into a geo-database and displayed on an online map.

For more info contact the Rotary Club of Kippa Ring -North Lakes. made, and local individuals are inspired to assist the project through to completion.

Much of this information, relating to the implementation of projects, is presented to Rotary clubs in their final report about their project and in most cases kept in our information silo, gathering dust. What was the transport company we used to get our pipes to the highlands? Did we encounter any social or tribal conflicts? Was there an international company who were interested in funding a portion of this project because of its location? Was a previous project, very similar to ours, a failure and why?

Where are the billions and billions of dollars spent? No one person has been able to tell me. However I am sure if you did some data mining at the Rotary Foundation level you may get some answers, but much of the information, at the grass roots level of the projects, isn't easily accessible to all, until now.

The mapping, of our Rotary project locations and the provision of links, to allow access and the sharing of detailed information, is now available on the web.

The Rotary Club of Kippa Ring - North Lakes has access to an online mapping system which allows current and historical projects to be located on a map, with links to project reports and imagery.



The mapping system developed by Rotarian Patrick Burke, of Yellow Dot Geospatial, allows Rotary members and the public to see where Rotary projects have been conducted and gain access to more detailed information, if required. But more importantly, the system allows individual Rotary Clubs, from anywhere in the world to upload information about their projects to the database and show the location on a map. Other clubs, from far and wide, who are planning a similar project, or another type of project in a location close by, may benefit greatly by reviewing projects in the area. The online map, which shows the projects that have already been uploaded to the database, is available at <a href="https://arcg.is/rTooPb">https://arcg.is/rTooPb</a>.



Access to the online form, which allows the data to be uploaded, is available by contacting the Rotary Club of Kippa Ring - North Lakes, by using an official Rotary email address.



Other uses for the online system includes instant analysis. The online map above was created to show water projects in Nicaragua, with the ability to create a ground surface profile when the user draws a line on the map. The user can then determine if gravity feed is possible from the start point throughout the planned pipeline corridor.

This web based Geographic Information System (GIS) is introducing innovation and spatial solutions to future projects. It has the potential to transform the way we store, analyse and share Rotary project information with other clubs and organisations.



### Fact Sheet | Rotary and ShelterBox

### Partnership background

The project partnership between Rotary and ShelterBox offers opportunities to collaborate in providing emergency shelter and vital supplies to stabilize, protect, and support communities affected by disasters and humanitarian crises.

### About ShelterBox

ShelterBox has provided emergency shelter and lifesaving supplies for families affected by more than 270 disasters in more than 95 countries, and has already helped over 1 million beneficiaries. Based in Cornwall, United Kingdom, with 18 international affiliates, ShelterBox is an international disaster relief charity that delivers emergency shelter, warmth, and dignity to people made homeless by disasters worldwide. The agreement with Rotary reaffirms the charity's volunteer base, enhancing its capacity to respond rapidly to disasters while keeping costs low. ShelterBox teams and their distribution partners are currently operating in Ecuador, Paraguay, Sri Lanka, Niger, Cameroon, Syria and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea.

### How do ShelterBox response teams operate?

A highly trained ShelterBox response team, composed mainly of volunteers, distributes ShelterBoxes at the site of a disaster, working closely with local organizations, international aid agencies, and a global network of volunteers. Each ShelterBox, tailored to the particular disaster, typically contains a relief tent for an extended family, blankets, water storage and purification equipment, cooking utensils, a stove, a basic tool kit, a children's activity pack, and other essential items. Distributions may also include SchoolBoxes containing essential tools for teachers and basic educational supplies for 50 children.

### How does our Rotary club or District get involved?

Rotary clubs and Districts assist ShelterBox with emergency disaster relief efforts that meet the needs of an affected community. Some collaboration examples include:

- \* Organizing and taking part in an event that raises funds for ShelterBox, or making a donation to ShelterBox
- \* Assisting with local deployment efforts by helping to clear aid through customs, accommodating response teams, or training members of local communities in setting up relief tents
- \* Aligning ShelterBox relief efforts with local governments and organizations working in areas devastated by disaster or humanitarian crisis.

### Operations Update 25th October 2017 Latest News& Deployments

Caribbean We are working across a number of islands impacted by Hurricane Irma and Maria and we are currently planning the distribution of aid. We have an in-country coordinator based in Antigua and four teams out in the field.

- St Kitts and Nevis 200 ShelterKits have been delivered
- Barbuba 1<sup>st</sup> phase support has been conducted we have supplied tents to support clean-up workers who are working to get the island functional (40 workers). 2<sup>nd</sup>phase support we are preparing aid now for when Barbudans can return to the island. - British Virgin Islands here we are providing support on two islands and have delivered 22 tents which will allow people to go home and start rebuilding their lives. This area is still experiencing bad weather which is making distribution difficult.
- Dominica 3000 solar lights, 3000 water carriers and 500 ShelterKits are being delivered. There is a substantial rebuild project going on in this island due to the extreme devastation caused by Hurricane Maria.
- Dominican Republic 800 ShelterKits have been allocated for this area. A small number has already been delivered and the rest will be delivered in the next few days.





### **Bangladesh**

The teams in-country are focusing on two separate responses: displacement caused by the monsoon flooding and the Rohingya crisis. **Flooding** - Heavy rains have caused widespread flooding in Bangladesh, particularly in the northern and central regions. It's estimated that more than half a million households were damaged during the floods, with over 70,000 of them completely destroyed. In this area we are supporting 3000 families - 1000 families who have been permanently relocated and 2000 families who will return to their homes.

ShelterBox has been working closely with the Bangladesh Red Cross and Rotary to identify shelter gaps, develop distribution plans and assess warehouse options ahead of aid arriving. Most of the aid has cleared customs although it's been a very challenging situation. Normally we do one customs clearance process to get aid out and delivered but in this instance we have had to do five customs clearances which has slowed things down considerably. The aid that has arrived in Bangladesh includes mosquito nets, tarpaulins, solar lights, ShelterKits, blankets, ropes and water carriers.

A lot of international attention has been on the Rohingya crisis in the south and the areas affected by flooding in the north have really struggled to get support. ShelterBox is now looking at another area of flooding that we can provide support to seeing in response to other aid agencies that are understandably focussing on the Rohingya crisis. ShelterBox takes very seriously the forgotten areas of need.

Rohingya crisis - we are responding to this ongoing mass humanitarian crisis. We are working with other aid agencies to

provide tarps, water carriers, blankets, rope and solar lights – all essential items. We have reports of a spike in the crime rate in this region (higher crime rates are generally associated with disasters, crisis and turbulence, as opportunistic people exploit the situation resulting in increases in child marriage, abduction, slavery, drug smuggling etc). This is where solar lights become extremely important, especially for women. People can keep one light at home and take one light when they go out at night – providing a key item of safety. Here we are supporting 4000 families – 8000 lights, 8000 water carriers (water filters are not needed as other aid agencies are providing water pumps). The first shipment of aid for Rohingya has cleared customs. Our Special Response Team member Jimmy Griffith has provided a first hand report on the Rohingya Crimin latters (water hand report on the Rohingya Crimin latters).

### Somaliland

We have supported 441 families here where we are responding to high levels of displacement caused by drought. We are awaiting the full evaluation report from our first distribution which is due this week. When we receive this report we will begin our second shipment of aid. The reason we wait for this evaluation report is to make sure that what we are doing is worthwhile, that we are using our donors' money well and that the money donated has the highest impact it can with our families.

#### Svria

ShelterBox has helped 10,000 families in Syria in 2017. 991 ShelterKits have been delivered this month and twelve trucks are on route with further aid to be distributed.

### Question:

How do we assess what aid is needed? **Answer**: Our teams conduct a rapid needs assessment in-country (which takes 2 days to 1 week) which determines what type of aid is needed and how much aid is required. We then conduct a more in-depth needs assessment to ensure when we go into individual communities we have already identified which families aid will be going to. This assessment is essential to maintain the fair and equitable distribution of aid.
