



Rotary Club of CANBERRA CITY

The Rotary Club of **Canberra City** was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Canberra and was admitted to Rotary International on 31st March 1975.

It was the first Club in the world to be chartered under a change in Rotary International Rules, which permitted Clubs to share identical territories. Initial membership was 22 and currently it is over 60.

They are proud of the fact that more than 14 languages are spoken at their club and they welcome new members from around the world. Their projects are highlights on the Canberra community calendar.

The Act Seasonal Antiques Fairs - Spring and Autumn, run in conjunction with this club, is the place to be seen in Canberra, and an opportunity to see a collection of the best antiques from around the country (ranging from jewellery, books, clocks, crockery, maps, furniture). Reputable vendors come from far as this is also seen in the Australian antiques community as the event of the year. All proceeds from their antique fairs go towards local community charity organisations.

Their Canberra Careers Market is attended by over 8000 thousands of high school and college students from Canberra and the surrounding NSW region. Around 90 universities and other higher education sphere showcase their courses. They support indigenous projects such as the Kintore Project which involved us sending a team of volunteers to assist with the build of a renal centre in an aborigine community 600 kms west of Alice Springs.

International projects include a joint venture with Engineers Without Borders supplying Railaco (a village in East Timor) with a bore hole, tank and water pump. They also have a five year goal / aim to make people aware of the homeless issue in Canberra and to assist in addressing this problem.

Subject: Rotary District 9600 Conference - Golf Day

The Pacific Harbour Golf and Country Club has been exclusively booked for a Rotary Golf Day on the Friday 1st May prior to the district conference. The event is proposed for Rotarians and Friends of Rotary. We intended to include a competition for the "Vic Honour" Perpetual Trophy currently held by the Rotary Club of Aspley since 2010 when it was last competed for but the rules for this event require a team of four with registered handicaps playing in a single stableford format with the winning team being the combined results of the players.

I think this will be too restrictive to the clubs being able to compete as many will not be able to field a team of four, and I am looking for suggestions from the members. The cost of the event has been heavily discounted by the golf club and is \$50 per player including electric cart hire.

We need to know how many players are interested in playing in a serious single Stableford event or a more fun event of a four or two ball Ambrose event where casual players with no official handicap can be partnered with better players. In an Ambrose, players all tee off together and drop their ball next to the best team drive making it more fun for learners to also get involved.

We want to give priority to Rotarians to play but if there is insufficient support, Friends of Rotary will be invited to participate.

We expect to have good sponsored prizes for a fun filled day.

Using their talents, expertise, and leadership, Rotary members worldwide are asked to be *gifts to the world* this upcoming 2015-16 Rotary year.

Rotary International President-elect K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran called Sunday's address to incoming district governors the "most significant moment of my life."

"All of you have been given so many gifts. And you have now been given this great gift: one year to take all your talents, all your gifts, everything that you are and can become -- and Be a Gift to the World," said Ravindran, revealing his presidential theme at the annual five-day training meeting in San Diego, California, USA. "You have one year to take that potential and turn it into reality. One year to lead the clubs in your district and transform the lives of others. The time is so short, yet there is so much to be done."

Highlighting Rotary's biggest challenge, the eradication of polio, Ravindran said, "A future without polio is a gift that we have promised to the children of the world. And indeed it is a gift that we will give."

Ravindran, a member of the Rotary Club of Colombo, Sri Lanka, used Rotary's successes in the fight to eradicate the disease as an illustration of the impact Rotary members can have in the world. When Rotary set a goal of eradicating polio 25 years ago, it was endemic in 125 countries, and more than 1,000 children were becoming paralyzed each day. Today, polio remains endemic in just three countries, Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. And in all of 2014, only 333 cases were reported. "We will battle on. We will prevail," he said.

Ravindran discussed some of Rotary's other challenges, including membership.

"We have to find a way to bring back the fundamentals that built our organization: the emphasis on high ethical standards in all aspects of our lives, and the classification system that encourages a diversity of expertise in each club," he said. "Too often these ideas are viewed as little more than inconvenient obstacles to increasing our membership. But they have been essential to Rotary's success, and we ignore them at our own peril."

Ravindran told attendees that the focus on branding is essential to helping Rotary grow. "We need to reposition our image, which we recognize has faded in many parts of the world," he said.

Rotary also needs to continue to raise funds for The Rotary Foundation, attract new members, and encourage greater participation from current members, he added.

"There are no easy answers to any of these questions. And yet the answers must somehow be found. We are the ones who must find them," said Ravindran.

The president-elect closed his speech emphasizing that now is the time to make real change.

"You have one year to build monuments that will endure forever, not carved in granite or marble, but in the lives and hearts of generations. This is our time. It will not come again. Let us grasp it," he said.

Team Heads to flood-hit Malaysia...

KUALA LUMPUR: Jan 17, 2015 —

A ShelterBox response team is on the way to Malaysia as the country is experiencing some of the worst flooding in decades.

In Gua Musang, Kelantan, rows upon rows of white futuristiclooking tents were erected in the backyard of a housing area, attracting curious visitors and onlookers.

Now a familiar sight for most locals, the campsite was set up by the National Security Council (NSC) to temporarily house victims of the recent major floods, but the tents themselves were contributed by international disaster relief charity ShelterBox.

Based in the United Kingdom, ShelterBox aims to provide temporary shelter and survival kits for families displaced by disasters. The recent floods which displaced over 250,000 Malaysians was its first disaster relief in the country.

"I think it's just unusual to be responding in Malaysia because it's an unusually large event for Malaysia," ShelterBox operations co-ordinator Sam Hewett told Malay Mail Online in an interview.

"We've never had to work here before ... the extent of the damage is unusual. I think Malaysia is quite resilient compared to other countries."

Instead of building a campsite, ShelterBox would set up the tents near the victims' previous homes or workplaces, so they can continue with their normal lives as much as possible.

ShelterBox was also in the middle of assessing the situation in Pahang, in places such as Pekan, Temerloh and Jerantut.

ShelterBox has responded to 250 disasters and humanitarian crises in around 90 different countries since its inception in Cornwall, UK in 2000.

The charity group works closely with local organisations and international aid agencies, including Rotary International that made ShelterBox its first project partner in 2012.

It also has long-term deployments in strife-torn Syria, Iraq and Gaza, and its last involvement in South-east Asia was when Typhoon Hagupit struck the Philippines in December 2014.











Each box costs an average of \$1,000 including all materials, packing, storage and distribution to individual recipients worldwide.
