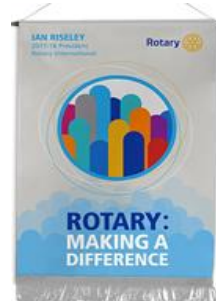

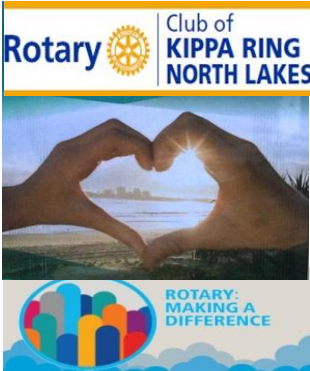


**BECOMING A CENTURION WITH POCKET CHANGE!**

Des has been a Director of Australian Rotary Health since 2015. He is also the Australian Chair of Dream Cricket, which was initiated by Dr Roly Bigg of the Movement Disorder Foundation in concert with the Rotary Clubs of the Southern Highlands and the Bradman Foundation. The aim was to provide primary school students with special needs an opportunity to play cricket activities on Bradman Oval. The DreamCricket program has grown to encompass schools and children throughout Australia and internationally.

Cattle Farmer



Left quadriplegic after a helicopter crash during a cattle muster, Rob has refused to let the difficulty in getting carers to his family's remote cattle station in the Northern Territory stop him from being a cattleman. He has relocated to Central Queensland and started an unusual new beef cattle venture, which includes running his own butcher shop. Rob and his wife Sarah went from working the 400,000-hectare station in the NT, to a 2,000-hectare property at Bucca near Bundaberg.

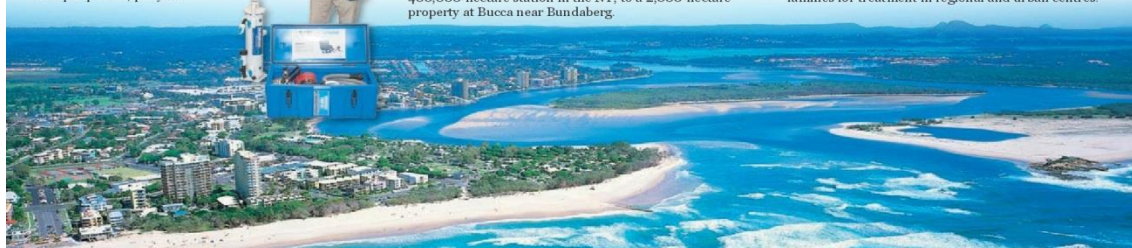
Alzheimer's Australia estimates more than 353,800 Australians have dementia and that 1.2 million people are involved in their care.

Purple House

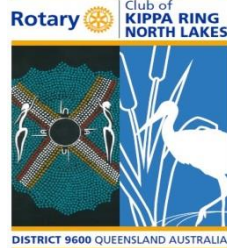


The Purple House provides dialysis services to remote patients in the NT and Western Australia and started 14 years ago in Ms Brown's lounge room, but now employs 50 people and services more than eight remote communities throughout the NT and WA. The mobile dialysis unit is important because it means people can stay on country and receive treatment rather than travelling hundreds of kilometres away from their families for treatment in regional and urban centres.

## WHAT WE KNOW

On February 26 2018 a 7.5 magnitude earthquake rocked Papua New Guinea. It's estimated that at least 145 people have died and 500,000 people have been affected.

These families are in remote mountain locations, their villages and communities have been devastated, and the emergency shelter need is high.

## ON THE GROUND

ShelterBox has sent an assessment team comprising Ops staff, two SRT volunteers from UK and US.

They are working with the Papua New Guinea Disaster Management Team, the Shelter Cluster and partners on the ground to make sure we can give families the right aid to help them rebuild their lives.

ShelterBox has vital aid, including tarpaulins, ropes and mosquito nets, stationed in Subang, Malaysia.

On arrival in the capital Port Moresby our teams will first assess need, and the challenges of reaching the most vulnerable.

**Rotary Peace Scholar: Ashuien Alor**

**Sponsor Rotary District: 5550**

Ashuien left his home country, South Sudan in 1983 when civil war broke out, and his village was destroyed. He fled to Khartoum as an internal refugee, and worked odd jobs to support himself while attending school in the evenings until he graduated from high school. Against all the odds, he qualified to apply for University admission at the Cairo University in Khartoum.

In 1989, he was forced again to flee as a refugee to Egypt in 1993. There, he returned to university and graduated in 1996 with a law degree. While in Egypt, he received protection from United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and was granted asylum in Canada in 1999 as a landed immigrant.

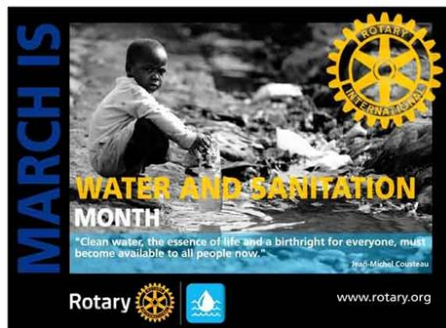
He volunteered with his Sudanese community in Winnipeg and joined the University of Manitoba to study Social Work. After graduation (Bachelor of Social Work), he worked with New Directions for Children, Youth, Adults and Families, an organization that provides social programs and employment for youth involved with the justice system as a Case Manager for youth and families from war-torn countries. After one year of service with New Directions, I applied to the Department of Justice of the provincial government of Manitoba and was hired as a probation officer providing mentorship and support to youth involved with the justice system.

He supported the African Communities of Manitoba to coordinate a research project funded by the government of Manitoba. This project was aimed at helping with the integration of African newcomers in Winnipeg. He is also a leader in his community and is past President of the Federation of Aweil Communities in Canada. He is committed to contributing to peace and conflict resolution through the use of the ideas and energies of young people, and has extensive experience working with immigrant groups from war-torn backgrounds.



*Each year, Rotary selects up to 100 professionals from around the world to receive fellowships to study at one of Rotary's peace centres. Our local Peace Centre is at the University of Queensland. Through academic training, practice, and global networking opportunities, the Rotary Peace Centres program develops leaders who become catalysts for peace and conflict prevention and resolution. These fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship and field-study expenses.*

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO

**Improve sanitation facilities** by providing toilets and latrines that flush to a sewer or safe enclosure.

#### TIPS FOR SUCCESS

- 1 Avoid implementing high-tech solutions in developing communities. Simple solutions are easier to learn and sustain.
- 2 Remember sanitation and hygiene: Very few people die from thirst; millions die from preventable waterborne diseases.

- 1 Work with the community to determine its needs and select appropriate solutions.
- 2 Before digging or drilling a new well, plan carefully to ensure that the water will be safe and the well is environmentally sustainable.
- 3 Empower the local community to take ownership of the project to ensure its success and sustainability.

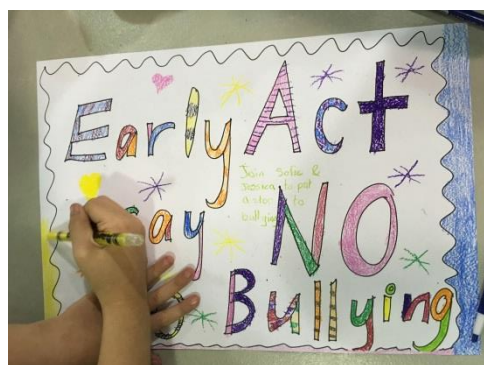
