DISTRICT GRANT APPROVED!

The District 9600 Rotary Foundation Committee has approved our District Grant application to Relocate fence at Mobility Way, Woody Point Special School.

This is one of three additional projects funded from the 2013-2014 District Grant funding from The Rotary Foundation. The money for the additional projects has become available because of the favourable exchange rate that applied when we received funding from TRF and also because one approved grant is not proceeding and two others have reduced costs.

Our approved project value is \$6,000 and the approved District Grant is \$3,000.

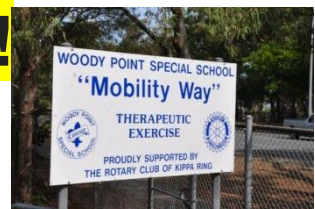
It is imperative to note that our project must commence immediately and that the District 9600 Rotary Foundation Committee must receive our claim for reimbursement by no later than 30 April 2014.

It is also important to note that: Grants are paid to **reimburse** club expenditure at the **completion of the project** and are subject to the Grants Committee Chairman receiving:

1. Original or certified copies of invoices and/or receipts for the project expenditure detailing the goods and services purchased, and
2. A Project Report, preferably including a photograph or two.

It is stressed that the reporting obligations are essential for payment of the Grant to our Club.

The Gala Dinner will commence at 6:30 for 7:00pm. A quartet from Matthew Flinders College will be playing in the dining room to welcome the guests. Later in the evening, we will be entertained by The Aboriginal Centre of Performing Arts performers (ACPA) and they will be followed by the band 'Beats Workin'. The evening will conclude at 11.00pm.

Sunday morning will commence with a talk about the Bribie Island Farm Project. We will then hear about Youth Exchange and the Kingaroy Flood Relief Program. This will be followed by Dr Adrian McCallum speaking on "Icy Adventures in Science and Engineering in the Arctic and Antarctica"

Dr Adrian McCallum currently serves as a Lecturer in science & engineering at the University of the Sunshine Coast, Queensland here he manages courses in soil mechanics, geotechnical engineering and climate change adaptation. He is fortunate to have led a life of adventure and exploration around the globe and is an expert in remote area science & engineering.

Our next keynote speaker will be Dr Bernie Tamba-Lebbie who will be talking about his life's journey which took him from being a farm boy in Sierra Leone to being an orthopaedic surgeon on the Sunshine Coast. This is an inspiring story of personal achievement. Dr. Bernard Tamba-Lebbie was born in a remote village in Sierra Leone to subsistence farmers. His father became a Jehovah's Witness and volunteered his son to go to school and be able to read the bible for the local congregation. Dr. Tamba-Lebbie quickly worked out that the classroom offered him a time away from labour on his father's farm. He dedicated himself to school as a means to break free from the poverty that came with staying in the bush. Be sure to hear Bernie's inspiring story.

After the roll call DG elect George Grant will introduce his team for next year. This will be followed by the presentation of awards.

RI Rep Ronald Finn will deliver his closing remarks and the conference will conclude by 12.30PM

Lionel McCray Memorial Trophy for the Outstanding Club of District 9600

- Above average contributions to The Rotary Foundation, with points given on both absolute and per capita bases.
- Above average net membership growth. Bonus points may be awarded here to a Club which has during the review period successfully sponsored the formation of a new Rotary Club or which at the time of submission is actively sponsoring the formation of a new club.
- Above average attendance, as calculated for the District Attendance Awards, this for 2014 will be based on the 12month review period May 2013 to April 2014 inclusive
- A significant Club project in which more than 50% of the Club members actually took part (other than donating money) with particular note taken of original or inventive projects

Furthermore, as this trophy is deemed to recognise the "Outstanding Club of District 9600 Consideration will be given to the extent to which applicant clubs are contributing to the smooth running of the District, this will include such items as membership of the District Committees, the run on-time return of reports, both regular and specially requested, and organization of, and attendance at, District related functions.

Service to Youth Award

Clubs must demonstrate a comprehensive programme of service to youth.

Eligible programs may have been in operation during any part of the 12 months up to the time of application.

This enables clubs to include as part of the application, financial contributions, usually made at the end of the Rotary year to various youth organisations.

The Herrington Shield For The Best Bulletin

The Bulletin should be presented in an attractive and open layout, easy to follow and with the object of inviting members and their families to read it . Judging guidelines with regard to content require the Bulletins to include;

- Club Information
- News about the Club, its members and partners and about Rotary matters in District 9600, Australia and Overseas.
- Editorial or President's Column.
- Humour, cartoons
- Photographs

To be considered for this Award a club should forward a specific application, including two copies of each of its five best issues. Even in cases where the primary distribution is by email or by website. Hard copies are required for award submissions and judging.

Heather Kinross Memorial Trophy for International Service

This trophy is awarded annually for a Club's activities in all things that can advance international understanding, goodwill and peace by its members becoming acquainted with people of other countries, their customs, cultures, accomplishments, aspirations, problems, through personal contact, travel, attendance at Conventions, through reading and correspondence, and through cooperation in all clubs activities and projects that will help people in other lands.

However, if we all believe in the foundation that Good prevails over Evil.. then we can all rest with some small recompense that Justice has been served! Our condolences and empathy go out to the entire community who has been involved with this occurrence, with special tribute to our Law Enforcement officers who worked tirelessly to bring some form of resolution to this terrible event.
