MOONLIGHTS—ROTARY CLUB OF YEPPOON

The three light levels allow several usages during the night: 2 hours of bright light, a few hours of medium light and low light for the whole night.

A project of the Rotary Club of Yeppoon Inc. **Project "MoonLight"**

Designed and developed in Cambodia, The aim is to replace millions of kerosene lanterns, within developing countries, which are costly in use and present a major fire risk in the straw and wooden houses. Islander and rural people need a portable lamp. Different rooms can be lit during the evening hours, and most homes cannot afford more than one lamp. Furthermore, a dimmed

light during the entire night is needed, to orientate in the dark and to feel safe at night.

Assembly of the solar lantern is done in Cambodia. Local assembly is also one of the social goals the developers and management from KamWorks have to create jobs in (rural) Cambodia.

Eyewitness to polio immunization days in Nigeria


During the second week of January, I was invited by a friend to a seminar in Abakaliki organized by the World Health Organization to train youth to assist in monitoring immunization efforts. At the end of the program, they conduct a test.

Luckily for me, I received a text several days later congratulating me for my test results and inviting me to serve as an independent monitor with a team taking part in National Immunization Days in February. After four days, I did not want it to end.

Listening to mothers share their previous vaccination experiences and working with a team of committed health care workers, doctors, and nurses was an uplifting experience. I also had a chance to visit with polio survivors and hear their stories of resilience and determination.

I was happy to be part of the team, trekking under the sun in search of children under the age of 5. I am proud my team was able to vaccinate thousands of children. A high point of the experience was watching our dedicated volunteers work with reluctant parents and convince them to allow their children to be vaccinated. It was a lot of work, but it was Rotary in action. We all worked together and developed bonds of friendship.

My experience motivated other Rotaractors to attend the seminars, and seek opportunities to serve as independent monitors. Let's join hands to combat polio and let peace work through our actions. A donation of just \$.60 helps save a child from polio. Together we can prevent other children from suffering from this horrible disease.



How to organize a new Rotary Fellowship?





Rotary news in brief from around the globe

The Rotary clubs of Howden, England, and Varna-Euxinograd, Bulgaria, collaborated on a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant project to provide a van for the Saint Joan Zlatoust Day Care Center for children with special needs in the city of Varna, on the Black Sea coast. The center offers full-time care and a variety of health, education, and rehabilitation programs. The bright red van will transport the children to and from their homes each day.

Great Britain ~ Last year, District 1120 (England) launched a purple crocus fundraiser, selling 25,000 fabric flowers and raising US\$40,000 for PolioPlus. This year, Rotary clubs in the United Kingdom, United States, Canada, and Nigeria aim to raise \$250,000. As of March, they had already sold 160,000 flowers. In the style of Remembrance Day poppies, the fabric flowers are designed to be worn on the lapel as a symbol of support for the fight against polio; crocuses were chosen because their purple color matches the dye used to mark the pinkie fingers of immunized children.

Guyana ~ Every year, the Rotary Club of Georgetown hosts a dinner in honor of World Understanding Month. In February, former prime minister of Jamaica Percival James Patterson spoke about the future of the Caribbean economic integration movement and the importance of the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) in promoting world understanding. CARICOM, headquartered in the Guyanese capital, promotes economic coordination and cooperation among member states.

Ghana ~ Members of the Rotaract Club of Ho spent time with residents of a village for people with Hansen's disease, also known as leprosy, in the Volta region in February. Although the disease is treatable today, those who have been cured still face a stigma in many places. The Rotaractors brought rice, cooking oil, frozen foods, toiletries, and used clothing worth more than US\$1,500 to the 80 villagers and their families. The club also plans to raise funds for improvements including painting, door lock and hinge repairs, mosquito net replacement, and septic tank maintenance.

Korea ~ Rotarians from District 3630 hosted a walkathon in February, raising about US\$18,000 for PolioPlus. Koreans are also fighting polio in the digital realm: As of press time, they had uploaded 1,338 photos of people making the "This Close" gesture to the End Polio Now "World's Biggest Commercial" project, second only to the United States and outpacing third-place Brazil.

Mexico ~ During the 2012 La Carrera Panamericana, an open-road race held in Mexico every October, 100 vintage race cars sported End Polio Now stickers as they sped nearly 2,000 miles over seven days, from Veracruz on the Gulf of Mexico up to Zacatecas in the north-central part of the country. Each day, drivers took part in events highlighting the importance of polio eradication, and Rotarians from a dozen clubs across several states in Mexico helped out, sharing Rotary's message with thousands of spectators and car enthusiasts.

Timor-Leste ~ For more than a decade, the Rotary clubs of Dili – the only club in the Democratic Republic of Timor-Leste – and Vila Real, Portugal, have worked together to foster the development of Timorese youth through vocational and education programs. The clubs have funded repairs for local primary schools, sponsored scholarships, and supported Movimento de Adolescentes e Crianças, a nonprofit that runs a center in Dili offering after-school programs. Today, the Dili club provides funding for the center through District 9550, which also covers parts of Australia.

United States ~ The Rotaract Club of Philadelphia held a "Philly Factor" talent contest in February. The University of Pennsylvania's Simply Chaos Comedy Troupe emceed the night, which featured performances from seven finalists chosen from 19 audition videos submitted on YouTube. Inertia, a student dance group from Philadelphia's University of the Sciences, took first place. The Rotaract Club of Beijing and the Penn chapter of Operation Smile, a nonprofit that provides free cleft lip and cleft palate surgeries in developing countries, partnered with the Philadelphia club on the event, which raised \$600 for Operation Smile's work in Yunnan, China.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT—JUNE MESSAGE

Dear fellow Rotarians,

A Rotary convention is a powerful thing, and a first convention is an experience you never forget.

My first was in Chicago, in 1980. That was the year I was president of the Rotary Club of Yashio. I thought we should learn more about Rotary, so I asked nine other members of my club to join me, and we travelled to Chicago together. We did not know what to expect from a Rotary convention. What we found was more than any of us had imagined.

That convention showed me Rotary, and changed me forever. It gave our club something to strive for. I came to that convention as a member of a Rotary club. I left it as a Rotarian. The feeling that entered my heart in Chicago is still there today.

I am glad I will have the opportunity, as an RI president from Japan, to be part of the convention in Portugal. Portugal and Japan have a history together that began in the year 1542. This was the year that a Portuguese boat landed on a southern Japanese island. The Portuguese sailors did not plan to come to Japan. Strong winds blew their boat off course. But it was a happy accident, and the beginning of a peaceful and prosperous relationship.

In 1993, Japan and Portugal celebrated 450 years of good relations. Portugal was the first European country visited by the Japanese, in the middle of the 16th century. And the long Portuguese presence in Japan has had a lasting effect on my country.

The Portuguese found Japan by accident. But it is no accident that Lisbon has been chosen for this convention. Lisbon is A Harbor for Peace. And peace is the theme of this convention, as it has been the theme between Japan and Portugal for nearly 500 years.

As Rotarians, we work toward peace in many ways. We do it through humanitarian service. We do it through our belief in Service Above Self. And we work toward peace simply by being who we are. Every year, when we come together for a Rotary convention, we see, for a few days, the world as it could be. We see people of all colors and cultures come together. We work to build a better world.

I hope you will join me, and your fellow Rotarians, as we celebrate this year of *Peace Through Service* together.







The club derives its name from an Australian aboriginal religious ceremony of making secular boys into sacred men who were then a Kippa.

This ceremony was performed in an area of two circles (or rings) that were to be found locally, hence the name Kippa-Ring.

The name was first approved in 1971 The Queensland Place Names Board has told Redcliffe Council it had noted the first approach for the establishment of a new school came from the Kippa-Ring Progress Association and while the name of the district was approved by the Board, it would prefer to see the name spelt "Kippa-Ring" in order to preserve the connotation with the aboriginal ceremony from which the name is derived.

Pat Gee, author of "Redcliffe - Looking at the Landscape" and noted local historian describes fully the origins and use of the suburbs name. Among other notes, she points out that the ring itself disappeared in the 1950s. In 1927 a Dr. Hobbs referred to the area - running across the Kipper Ring flats then over a neck of swampy land to Scarborough.
