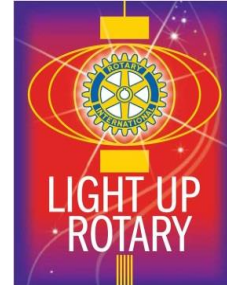

The Rotary Club of Whangaparaoa, where pods of orcas and dolphins can be seen regularly. Whangaparaoa Peninsula is on the North Island of New Zealand, and was once a rural settlement for the Maoris, hence the name which is Maori for Bay of Big Fish.

Today it is a growing rural suburban area about 25km from downtown Auckland and the club is in the Rotary District of Auckland North. It has a mixed membership of 45 plus five honorary members who reside in the UK. Many members are ex-Pats. The club meetings are held every Thursday evening. The Rotary Club of Whangaparaoa was established in 1988. The formal Charter meeting was held on 27th August, 1988. The District Governor, David Graham, presented the Charter and chain of office to charter President Larry Johnson who introduced the 22 initial members. It was unfortunate that none of those members had previously been a Rotarian and the club had an initial struggle to establish its procedures, financial status and standing in the District. Over the next six years it fell away to below 20 before vigorous efforts revived it and took it to over forty by 2012. Their main fund raiser is the Annual Hibiscus Coast Soap Box Derby and Fun Day. People come from miles around with their custom-built soap boxes.

In the early days we acquired the bare box trailer only.. we had to supply mesh cage/frame and in some instances wheels ..which our Club Members either acquired or indeed made!

September 1991 – First Club meeting to discuss potential Christmas Stocking trailer raffle

October 1991 – TIG Trailers donated a 6x4' box trailer with gift donations from 13 local businesses.

1992 – Dean Wells MP drew winning ticket.

1993 –1995 8000 tickets sold..i.e. SOLD OUT ...

1996 – SOLD 7,000 tickets .. 1997 – 9,600 tickets

sold.. Winners had no use for contents so they donated them to Redcliffe Hospital Childrens Ward ... 1998 – Average sales of 1,300 tickets per week over 6 weeks ... 2000 – 8,238 tickets sold.. Winner's mower had blown up the morning we advised them :)

2001 – Sold Out – only 130 tickets left on day of actual draw! ... 2003 - very slow sales as we moved to Peninsula Fair S/C .. 2004 - 9,716 tickets sold .. 2005 - Sold Out 2 hours before draw time! ... 2007 – Sold out by December 14!

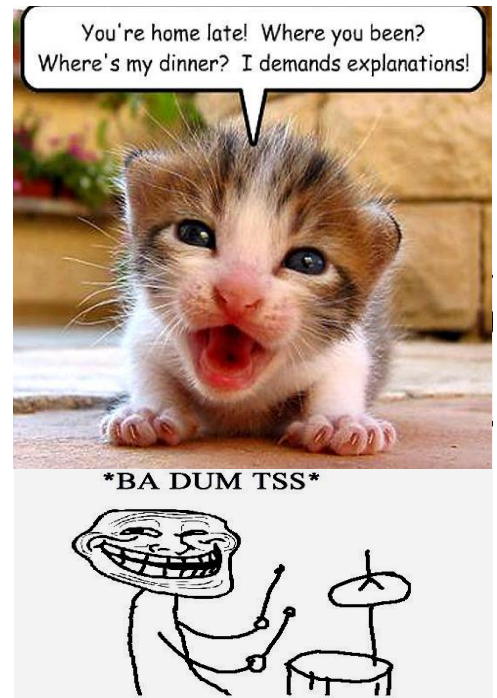

Young volunteer building shelter and security in Cambodia

While most girls her age were enjoying the recent school holidays, 16-year-old Savannah Inouye was busy banging nails into wooden floors and helping fit steel cladding to walls in a handful of houses being built for homeless families in Cambodia.

Savannah and her father, Gidgegannup businessman Stephen Inouye, were members of a Rotary Club of Perth, WA, team participating in a Tabitha Foundation Australia initiative that encourages volunteers to help construct simple houses for desperate families in the region.

"By western standards the houses are very small and simple, but for these families they are the first permanent structures they have ever lived in," Savannah said. "To see the joy and gratitude on their faces as they receive their new homes is so rewarding; it makes all the bruised thumbs and splinters worthwhile."

Working with Khmer builders in sweltering conditions, the team of volunteers helped erect 15 houses in two days during their week-long visit.

Each house costs \$1500, which is raised by volunteers, however Cambodian families involved in the project have to contribute \$25 towards the cost of their home.

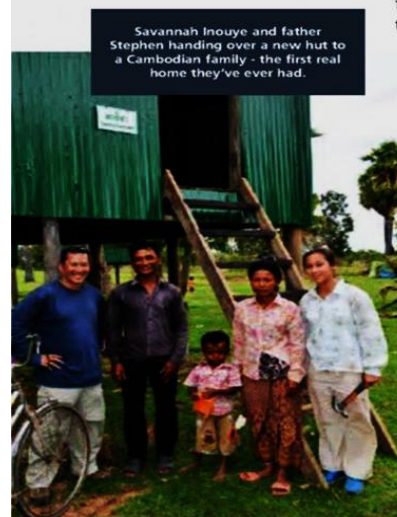
"While this may seem a trivial amount to us, it may take a Cambodian family three to five years to save," Stephen said.

"Houses are vital for the health and protection of family possessions, particularly during the rainy season. By reducing the level of sickness and lost property, families are better equipped to break the cycle of poverty and concentrate on working and saving."

President of the Rotary Club of Perth Ted Wilhelm said club members had been helping build houses in Cambodia for a number of years.

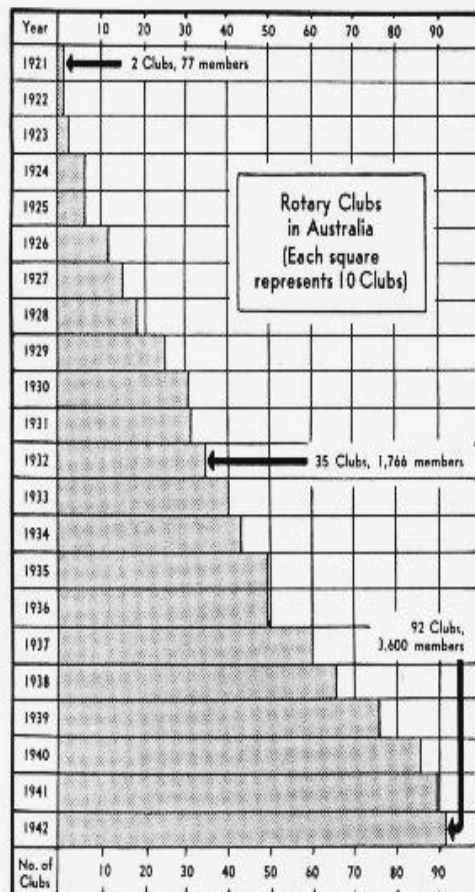
"It's been a fantastic initiative and having young volunteers like Savannah wanting to take part makes it even more meaningful," he said.

History of Rotary in AUSTRALIA



FOR 22 YEARS the number of Rotary Clubs in Australia has increased with stair-steps regularity.

Rotary in Australia

HAD IT NOT BEEN for World War I, Rotary might have sunk roots in Australia long before it did—for Australian businessmen who had visited the young Rotary Clubs of the United States and Canada had coveted Rotary for their cities as early as 1914. But actual organization of the first two Clubs—Melbourne and Sydney—was to wait until 1921, when two esteemed Canadian Rotarians (see cut above) carried Rotary to Down-Under Land. Several Canadian Rotary Clubs helped underwrite expenses. Australians took to Rotary, and Clubs have increased steadily, as the chart shows. There are now 92, listed below. Should your newspaper some day report the bombing of

any of these towns, make note of the high probability that Rotarians and their families there are among those “taking it.” Remember at the same time, however, that in countless ways they are helping Australia prepare to cushion such a blow—and to return it in double strength.

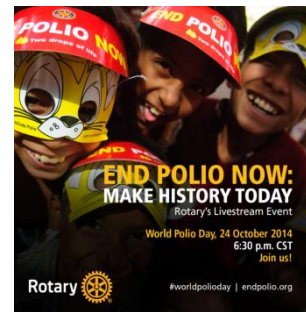

3 Endemic Countries Left **2.5 BILLION** Children Immunized Against Polio **119,350** Have signed on with Rotary to make history

Rotary marked **World Polio Day 2014** with US\$44.7 million in grants to fight polio in Africa, Asia and the Middle East.

With the world "This Close"—99%—to eliminating polio from the planet, the effort is receiving an additional US\$44.7 million boost from Rotary to support immunization activities, surveillance, and research spearheaded by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, which aims to end the disabling viral disease worldwide by 2018.

Polio is set to become the second human disease ever to be eliminated from the world (smallpox is the first). To date, Rotary has helped 193 countries stop the transmission of polio through the mass immunization of children. Rotary's new funding commitment, announced in advance of the Oct. 24 observance of World Polio Day 2014, targets countries where children remain at risk of contracting this incurable, but totally vaccine-preventable, disease.

End Polio Now: Make History Today' Livestream Event 24 October 2014 - World Polio Day, (6:30 pm CT)
For the second year in a row, Rotary marked World Polio Day with a livestream event featuring a global status update on the fight to end polio as well as an array of guest speakers and performers. Streaming from Chicago, and hosted by TIME magazine science and technology editor Jeffrey Kluger, highlights of the event included:

Tessanne Chin, 2013 winner of the TV show "The Voice," performed a song during the program, followed by a benefit concert after the event

Reggae star **Ziggy Marley** welcomed participants to the event and performed via video

Minda Dentler, polio survivor and Ironman competitor, shared her personal story. Remarks via video by **Olivier Charmeil**, chief executive officer of Sanofi Pasteur and **Bernadette Hendrickx**, Senior Medical and Scientific advisor to the CEO of Sanofi Pasteur delivered remarks live.

Addresses were also made by Rotary International General Secretary John Hewko, Rotary Foundation Vice-Chair Michael McGovern, and Dr. James Alexander, senior medical epidemiologist at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.



History of Margate

Margate is a residential suburb of the Moreton Bay Region. It is situated in the east of the Redcliffe Peninsula, approximately 26 kilometers north-northeast of Brisbane.

Margate Beach area was inhabited by nomadic Aboriginal tribes for thousands of years prior to European settlement which began in 1824 becoming Queensland's first colony. Unfortunately this attempt at establishing the settlement failed soon after and the colony was moved to Brisbane. Agriculture became the region's main source of income and prosperity until the late 1800s when the population expanded. Holidaymakers and day trippers lured by the waters of Moreton Bay began to visit the area in large numbers. The construction of the Hornibrook Highway Bridge in 1935 saw easier access to Brisbane and a larger population growth for the area.

Margate features one of the longest mainland coastal stretches of a sand beach in the area. A boardwalk promenade embellishes the scenery for those who enjoy walking, cycling, rollerblading or scootering including viewing shelters and seating and barbecue facilities with views to Moreton Island. This enhanced lifestyle and atmosphere of beach living rests easy with visitors and is just metres from the waters of Moreton Bay.

The \$6 million Margate CBD major redevelopment was completed in November 2007 modernising the distinctive shopping precinct, making the area more attractive and comfortable.

At regular intervals along the esplanade visitors can enjoy the seating and shelters, with barbecues and other picnic amenities. There's a favourite swimming spot with clean white sand and sheltered waters - making it a popular dipping spot for families with young children.

Scotts Point at the southern end of Margate is perfect for windsurfing. This is one of the few locations close to Brisbane which is not majorly affected by tides.

The quaint Scotts Point swimming pavilion is an historical reference to a bygone era. There are many Norfolk Pine trees lining the esplanade which were planted by the first settlers in the area, more than 150 years ago.

Margate Beach has a busy shopping precinct with shops clustered around Oxley Avenue. You can choose from fine diners overlooking the water through to cafes and takeaway shops. Margate Parade offers great waterfront dining and fish and chips at the beach are also a well practised past time.
