On Saturday the 23rd of February 2013 Hamilton Rotary held a Swim-a-thon at Nudgee College pool to coincide with similar events organised by Rotary Clubs on the same day around the world for End Polio Now. This is of course the birthday of Rotary and funds raised to the End Polio Now campaign. The photos are of the group that represented the R.C. of Kippa Ring. The Home of Rotary Swimarathon— Grantham Rotary Swimarathon

The Rotary Club of Grantham 354. District 1070, RIBI has been running a very successful Swimarathon for the last 23 years. During this time, the event has raised over £550,000 for local and worthwhile causes.

In 2010 Rotary Club of Grantham was honoured to receive Rotary International's 'Significant Achievement Award' (awarded to approximately 100 Clubs out of 33,000 Clubs worldwide each year.) for its efforts in the Community through Swimarathon.

Most recently, on November 5th 2011, Rotary Club of Grantham's long-serving Swimarathon chair Roger Graves had the honour of receiving a national Swimming Association (ASA) special achievement award for fundraising at the Swimtastic2011 event.

Like most events of its kind, it started out in a small way, and has grown to be a 3 day event with 230 teams of swimmers, who have collected sponsorship, doing as many lengths of the swimming pool as possible in 55 minutes. Each of the 8 lanes has up to 6 swimmers taking it in turns to do a length. There is a lot of 'clicking' to keep count of the number of lengths, and behind the scenes energy to produce a team photograph and certificates for each participant whilst they are swimming.

In 2012 the event raised £45,000 and 90% of this was handed back to numerous local charities and worthy projects at a special presentation evening. (10% was used for Club projects). A real community event with local people helping to local organisations and at the same time keeping fit and having lots of fun! New features have just been added that allow clubs to plan and track service projects from beginning to end, and set public relations goals. Log in through Member Access, and help your club work more efficiently by using the tool to set and measure club goals.

The club derives its name from an Australian aboriginal religious ceremony of making secular boys into sacred men who were then a Kippa.

This ceremony was performed in an area of two circles (or rings) that were to be found locally, hence the name Kippa-Ring.

The name was first approved in 1971 The Queensland Place Names Board has told Redcliffe Council it had noted the first approach for the establishment of a new school came from the Kippa-Ring Progress Association and while the name of the district was approved by the Board, it would prefer to see the name spelt "Kippa-Ring" in order to preserve the connotation with the aboriginal ceremony from which the name is derived.

Pat Gee, author of "Redcliffe - Looking at the Landscape" and noted local historian describes fully the origins and use of the suburbs name. Among other notes, she points out that the ring itself disappeared in the 1950s. In 1927 a Dr. Hobbs referred to the area - running across the Kipper Ring flats then over a neck of swampy land to Scarborough.
