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

MAUREEN HALL TALKS ROTARY PROJECTS!

Tonight, we welcome back a good friend to our Club - Maureen Hall - to discuss Rotary projects.. namely Operation Cleft and Interplast.



Our speaker, Maureen Hall, is Rotary District 9600 ambassador for Interplast and Operation Cleft programs. These programs "repair bodies and rebuild lives". Operation Cleft is a unique Rotary project that provides free cleft repair surgery for underprivileged children in third world countries .. viz..Bangladesh where 1 in 500 babies (approximately 5,000) are born with this condition each; largely due (it is thought) to poor nutrition during pregnancy.

What is a cleft:

* Cleft lip and/or palate is a congenital abnormality that is seen frequently around the world. The cause of cleft lip and/or palate is typically a genetic one, but there is also evidence that environmental factors during pregnancy may play a role. Infection, lack of adequate nutrition or exposure to certain chemicals, drugs or medications may also be contributing factors.


Over the period of a 1 to 1.5 hour operation undertaken by volunteer doctors a whole new life could be opened up for children and young people. By training local doctors and nurses the Interplast teams leave behind the skills needed to sustain the treatment of sick and damaged kids and adults in needy areas of the world.

The programs are active in 24 countries where 35,000 consultations and 21,000 life changing operations have been undertaken.. No doubt Maureen will provide us with an interesting presentation tonight!





people known as "Shut Ins". These are unfortunate people who are mostly elderly and are either ill, incapacitated in some way, or poor and the sad fact is that they hardly ever leave their place of living. "Shut Ins" live in accommodation of very poor quality. The project in the beginning was hard yakka and Barry had only had three member helpers, including Bill Stirling. The President of that time was doubtful it would work, but Barry persisted and it has become one of our Club's meaningful projects. When Barry handed over the reins of the Community Service Portfolio he entrusted Julie Frauenfelder with its future. Julie has carried on taking the "Shut Ins" project to a new level. Barry relied on the usual volunteers, but Julie initiated the idea that each member of the club should deliver and make contact with a "Shut In". Julie also has increased the 20 receivers of a wonderful hamper to 30 plus.

Explanation of the Project ... the mission... Albury-Hume Rotary Club to target 30 needy, lonely and elderly people, known as "Shut Ins" with the purpose of bringing a little joy an

d friendship at Easter by providing a welcome Easter hamper. The names of the "Shut Ins" are provided by Meals on Wheels. Hamper to comprise non-perishable food items, tinned or packaged plus an Easter egg. The project is completely member driven.

Procurement of goods ... Initially members were challenged to raid their pantry and put together items that have been there for a while and not likely to be used or needed. Now most items are purchased by Julie from cash donations although some members prefer to donate goods of their choice.

Packing of hampers ... This is done at a Club meeting with members packing the thirty hampers on the Wednesday meeting prior to Good Friday. The hampers are finished off being wrapped in cellophane and tied with an Easter bow. A greeting card from the Club, designed and printed by Peter Merkesteyn is included in each hamper.

Distribution... Hampers are delivered by members on the Wednesday or Thursday prior to Good Friday. Every member is given a hamper to deliver. The project which is completely self-funded by the members not only brings joy and happiness to the people known as "Shut Ins" but to Club members a feeling of heartfelt service and joy which Rotary is all about – "Service above Self". In most cases the recipients of the hampers welcomed the knock at the door, the gift of a hamper particularly the Easter eggs and most importantly a welcome chat.

The thanks expressed to Rotary, some expressed with tears was great to hear and made members proud to be a Rotarian.

What were ROTARIANS up to this Easter?









Audio books for the visually impaired



There are many visually impaired children in Italy and Sicily who lack teaching materials and educational aids. The purchase and distribution of books in Braille is difficult, there is only one distribution house in Sicily, and the cost of audio books is very high. The present economic crisis and lack of public funds also does not help.

So as members of Rotaract, we joined together with the Rotary Club of Caltanissetta to record and produce three audio books which we distributed to 750 children with visual impairments in primary, middle, and high schools in Sicily. We intend to make the audio books available to schools free of charge as a teaching tool.

We held 15 different events, including a concert by the renowned master Luigi Mariani, who is himself blind, to raise money for our project. We worked closely with the ministry of education, the City of Caltanissetta, and the Braille Printing House of Catania.

We are also putting the files of the audio books on the Internet so they will be available to blind children anywhere in the world, and not just Italy.

Through Rotary and Rotaract, we are able to accomplish so much more than we could ever accomplish on our own. It gives us a platform to work with other groups, like the ministry of education, to really make a difference in our communities.

More than half of Rotarians worldwide receive a regional magazine instead of The Rotarian. These publications are produced independently by Rotarians, distributed in more than 130 countries, and published in 24 languages. They have a combined circulation of 872,000. Each magazine has a regional point of view but also includes articles and photographs of international interest from The Rotarian.

In addition, Rotary International publishes Rotary Canada, a quarterly supplement to The Rotarian with a circulation of 28,000.

ROTARY WINS PRESTIGIOUS SILVER TELLY FOR AIDS DOCUMENTARY

A documentary film produced by Rotary's broadcast media department that features Rotary member Marion Bunch and her work to prevent the spread of HIV/AIDS in underprivileged African communities won two 2015 Telly Awards.

The prestigious awards are given annually to the finest film and video productions. Rotary's documentary, "Rotary Family Health Days" received a Silver Telly, the highest honour, in the online video-documentary category, and a Bronze Telly in the online video-branded content and entertainment category. The documentary was shown by the South African Broadcasting Corporation and throughout Africa.

"What we tried to accomplish with the film was to get the good news and the good deeds out there so that the non-Rotary world can see it," says producer Andrew Chudzinski. "It was a great collaborative project."

The film documents the tremendous burden HIV/AIDS places on African families and communities. It covers the journeys of two women: South African grandmother Me Maria, who is raising her two grandsons whose parents died of AIDS, and Bunch, from Atlanta, Georgia, USA, who became a global advocate for AIDS prevention and the inspiration for Rotary Family Health Days after she lost her son to the disease.

"Because of that one single tragedy, my life's journey changed dramatically, from a very engaged businesswoman to a warrior on AIDS and advocate of human rights," Bunch told senior White House staff in October, when she was honored as one of 10 Rotary Women of Action for 2014. A member of the Rotary Club of Dunwoody, Bunch is the founder and CEO of Rotarians for Family Health and AIDS Prevention, a group of members that collaborates with Rotary clubs and districts on health-related projects.

The Rotary Health Days project, now in its fifth year and supported by Rotary clubs in Africa, has grown to deliver free basic health care, including HIV/AIDS screening and other preventive services, to underserved communities in Ghana, Nigeria, South Africa, and Uganda. It began in 2010, when Ugandan Stephen Mwanje, then governor of District 9211, asked Bunch if the Rotarian group would organize a multisite, comprehensive health event.

"The tremendous burden on the families of those infected by HIV/AIDS -- particularly for older people caring for their terminally ill children and raising their grandchildren, and for children orphaned by this disease -- is incalculable," says Bunch. "This is a story of people coming together to help fight this global killer and other preventable diseases."

The award-winning documentary was a joint project of the public relations and broadcast media staff at Rotary's world headquarters in Evanston, Illinois. In addition to Chudzinski, producer Vivian Fiore, video editor Todd Murphy, and executive producer Stephen Guenther worked on the film.

"We went through many different outlines, thoughts, and angles, and worked closely with Marion [Bunch] on it," says Fiore. "It evolved into a better piece than we all imagined."
