Rotary Club of Surfers Sunrise make homemade wheelchairs for disabled children from old push bikes.

Members of the Surfers Sunrise Rotary Club said there was an unprecedented demand for their homemade wheelchairs in Third World countries. Project organiser Daryl Sanderson said the 600 push-bikes donated to them last year were now gone.

"It takes two bikes to make one wheelchair so we are now desperate to get bikes and it's a problem for us," he said. Every Saturday at a shed in Arundel, on the northern Gold Coast, more than a dozen volunteers convert old push-bikes into wheelchairs.

Rotary Club member Bob Harrison said the helpers enjoyed the work and the companionship. "The volunteers that come here on Saturday morning, they just can't get here quick enough and they don't want to go home," he said

The program started 18 years ago when a Rotary Club member travelled to Fiji and saw children immobilised by their disability. Since then more than 7,000 wheelchairs have been built and shipped to 31 countries including Vietnam, Vanuatu, Cambodia and Nigeria.

Mr Sanderson said he had seen first-hand the impact the wheelchairs had on peoples' lives. "Having been to quite a few countries and just seeing the look on the kids' faces and they have nothing at all," he said. "So I get a lot of pleasure out of that."

Rotarians for Family Health & AIDS Prevention and Rotary club members from Nigeria, Kenya, and Uganda sponsored a three-day event to provide HIV testing and counseling for more than 138,000 people.

## DEMO Farm Project - Rotary Club of Pag-Asa, RCC & Interactors

Establishing a formal organic vegetable farm in partnership with the high school and community

The Marilog High School of Agriculture is in a remote, tribal area of the Marilog District of Davao City on the island of Mindanao. This is a special category vocational high school that has its main purpose to teach the students the knowledge and skills needed to become successful farmers. Most of the students are from farming families but lack the knowledge to grow more than simple crops. As part of the newly added grades 11/12, the focus will be on organic farming, with higher value crops. The school however, lacked expertise and resources to effectively implement this curriculum addition. In partnership with a business owned by a Rotarian, Wynward Farms and with the assistance of an NGO founded by a Rotarian and with the full cooperation of the school, RC Pag-Asa, Philippines, the RCC and Interact Club in the area, a project has been started. This project started with the relationship built with the school and community through a water and sanitation Global Grant for water filters/toilets.





## Meet our polio partners

Eradicating polio is a complex job. Since 1988, we've collaborated with the World Health Organization, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF to tackle the disease through our Global Polio Eradication Initiative. Here's how our roles break down.

#### The Strategist: WHO

The World Health Organization (WHO) coordinates the management and administration of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative and provides technical and operational support to ministries of health in countries around the world. WHO is responsible for monitoring our progress and strategic planning.

#### The Virus Hunter: CDC

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) deploys epidemiologists, public health experts, and scientists to investigate outbreaks of polio, identify the strain of poliovirus involved, and pinpoint its geographic origin.

#### The Immunizer: UNICEF

UNICEF buys polio vaccine and manages its distribution. The agency spreads the word about the benefits of vaccination to gain community acceptance – a process known as social mobilization. On the ground, field workers immunize children with the help of local health workers and volunteers such as Rotarians.

#### The Advocate: Rotary

Rotary uses its members' business acumen and passion for volunteerism to build awareness, fundraise, and encourage national governments to donate to and otherwise support the polio eradication effort. More than one million Rotary members have volunteered their time and personal resources to help end polio.

#### **Our other partners**

WHO, CDC, UNICEF, and Rotary spearheaded the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, but many other partners help us work toward our vision of a polio-free world.

**Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation:** The Gates Foundation is a core partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. It is the largest private funding source of the GPEI, contributing over \$1.9 billion to the fight against polio. The Gates Foundation will match all donations to Rotary for polio two to one, up to \$35 million per year, through 2018.

**National governments:** Governments are the largest donors to the polio eradication effort. Without the financial support of governments worldwide, and especially political support in polio-endemic and at-risk countries, we could not administer the polio vaccine.

**Local health workers:** Local health workers often risk their lives to vaccinate children. For example, women in Pakistan receive training to go door to door, speaking to mothers about the benefits of the vaccine. They address fears and help bring the vaccine into remote communities.

**Gavi:** Gavi is an international vaccine alliance that brings vaccines to some of the world's poorest countries. It is working with the GPEI to introduce at least one dose of the injectable inactivated polio vaccine into the routine immunization schedule.

### Maryborough turning the tide on family violence

"It's a growing issue throughout Australia and for small country towns where the fall out is often amplified," president of the Rotary Club of Maryborough Garry Higgins said. "Family violence has no socio-economic distinction. It involves boiler suits to business suits, battlers to billionaires and anything in between, from the North Shore of Sydney to the Adelaide Hills and Maryborough too."

The Maryborough community is now taking a stand against violence in their town. They want to see Maryborough and the district prosper so they're doing what country people do best – rolling up their sleeves and working together. "We've developed a Support, Advice, Facilitation and Early Intervention (SAFE) model, which involves Rotary working with local, state and national organisations on strategies to assist victims, offenders, their families and the general community.

"It's the lynchpin that brings everyone in the community together to contribute their specialised skills and services." A key component of the campaign is the #SayNO2familyviolence social media message that also headlines the posters and brochures being used to create awareness about the project and its aims.

The project is largely Rotary funded and is underpinned by an excellent network of service providers. The Central Goldfields Shire is the lead agency for family violence in the region and Go Goldfields general manager Sharon Fraser is strongly supportive of Rotary's initiative. "This is an innovative and collaborative approach to tackling a highly concerning issue," Sharon said. "That Maryborough Rotary has elected to take up the challenge is heartening."

Rotary has also enlisted the help of the local police and they've sponsored one officer in a pilot project to attend a course on working with men involved in family violence. They are also providing vocational scholarships to two people to benchmark the world's best practice and learn about successful strategies undertaken in overseas communities.

They've got the local footy club on board – an imperative in cultural and behavioural influence – who have volunteered to get involved in the campaign. Garry concedes that turning the tide will take commitment and time.

"But it's a start and we can help change things by getting the message out through peer pressure and leading by example that violence is unacceptable. We want people to be able to live and work in a healthy and safe environment and enjoy our town."
