

#### **TONIGHT.. RC KIPPA-RING WELCOMES BACK DON WOODLAND!**

Don Woodland is a legend in the Salvation Army and the first person to devise a trauma counselling service for the armed forces, police force and ambulance workers. He has served in the Vietnam War and was on site 'next day' at the majority of Australia's worst disasters including Bali, Cyclone Tracey, Papua New Guinea's Tsumani, Childer's Backpackers and Kings Cross Backpackers fires, Granville Rail disaster, Strathfield massacre and Port Arthur. He learnt the English concertina as a child from his father who also played the instrument in the Salvation Army. He retired from fulltime pastoral work in 2004 and continues to work as a lecturer. 

International Toast







The Rotary Club of Shanghai has a complex history. The club was chartered in 1919 as the first club in China. The charter was cancelled in 1943; however the club was chartered again in 1946 only to have the charter cancelled again in 1951. Expatriate Rotarians started meeting regularly in Shanghai again in 1997 to support worthy projects in their community, to encourage strong business ethics, and to promote the Object of Rotary. This led to the Club gaining provisional status in 2001 and being chartered in 2006. Club membership is by invitation only and based on the classification principle where each member represents his or her vocation or profession. Membership is currently restricted to holders of non-PRC passports. The club currently has around 90 members who represent more than 23 nationalities. Average age of members is 45... 80% Male / 20% female.. Current President is American, and his predecessors were German, Indian and Canadian. Some of the projects the Club supports are Gift of Life Shanghai, providing heart operations for the underprivileged; Aids Awareness Program and Wheelchair donations to the needy in China. They also support several youth projects through Past President Percy Chu Scholarships along with Rotaract and Interact. The Club meets for dinner every Tuesday @ 40<sup>th</sup> floor of Hilton Hotel..





### Bio on Lieut-Col.DonWoodland OAM

Donald Thomas Woodland was born in China in 1937 to Australian Salvation Army Officer parents who had served in China as Missionaries for 21 years. The youngest of three sons and one daughter, returned with his family to Australia in 1941 on the last boat from Shanghai before the Japanese occupation.

At the age of ten years his mother died, and the family moved from Sydney to their hometown Brisbane where he continued schooling, later becoming a tradesman in Surgical Footwear. He married Bernice Arnold in the Salvation Army Citadel West End, Brisbane in March 1959 and the following year (1960) they both entered The Salvation Army Theological



College, Sydney for training. Following their Commissioning and Ordination, Don and Bernice served in a number of country towns as The Salvation Army Officers in Mullumbimby (NSW) Bowen, Inala, Laidley & Helidon. (Q'land).

1977 the family returned to Sydney where Don commenced a 4-year posting with the Royal Australian Army Chaplain's Department as Chaplain to the Army Units on Middle Head and frequently travelling to Kapooka Training Bn.Wagga Wagga to conduct Character Guidance Seminars.

1977 Don was at the scene of the Granville Train Disaster and at the major Bush Fires that ripped through the Blue Mountains during that year.

In conjunction with his Pastoral responsibilities at The Salvation Army Corps, Hurstville, Sydney, he was invited to commence Chaplaincy with the New South Wales Fire Brigades, such involvement commenced in March 1981 on a part-time basis for 4 years. During those years he was at the scene of major incidents such as the Sylvania Nursing Home Fire, the Rembrandt Hotel Fire, Kings Cross. 1985 the workload necessitated he become the Services' first full-time Senior Chaplain. This appointment was the first full time appointment to a statutory body in Australia for the next eleven years throughout the state of New South Wales, It was during those years he developed his skills in Trauma Management, Critical Incident Management and Grief Crisis counselling and saw much of this program being implemented throughout the Services as an integral part of 'caring for the carer'

During his years as Chaplain to the NSW Fire Brigades, other statutory bodies were watching the work of the Chaplain e.g., the NSW Police Force, Queensland Police and Fire Services and the West Australian Fire Brigade. Subsequently the West Australian Fire Brigade and later the West Australian Police adopted Chaplaincy as part of their respective Service.

Administration work with The Salvation Army took Don and Bernice back to Canberra in 1992 for three and a half year appointment as The Salvation Army's Divisional Commander for the ACT & South NSW Division.1995 they returned to Sydney where he was appointed by The Salvation Army to establish Chaplaincy Programs throughout the ACT, New South Wales and Queensland, covering Police, Fire and Ambulance, Courts and Prisons and in October 1995 he completed the installation of a Chaplaincy Program for the New South Wales Fire Services and became Senior Chaplain to their 70,000 members until January 1997.

Don's skills in Trauma Management have been finely tuned with on the scene involvement in incidents such as Grafton and Kempsey Bus Crashes, the Newcastle Earthquake, the Massacre at Strathfield, Sydney and the Massacre at Port Arthur, Tasmania where he took his Trauma Management Team and worked with the staff and management of the Port Arthur Historic Site for the week following that tragedy. As a token of their appreciation for his work and empathy with them, the staff paid his air-fare back to Port Arthur for the National Memorial Service held some weeks after he had returned to Sydney.


Following the 'Backpackers Trial' in Sydney, Don was called in by the Trial Judge to debrief the jury; this again was the first time such action had been taken by the judicial system in New South Wales. 1990 he was awarded the Order of Australia Medal for Service to the Community through the NSW Fire Brigades.


Don has been a member of Rotary International since 1967 serving in clubs such as Kingaroy and Sandgate (Queensland), Chatswood and Hurstville (Sydney), Western Creek Rotary, Canberra and the Canberra Rotary Club. In 1991, Don was honoured with the Paul Harris Fellowship by the Rotary Club of Hurstville, Sydney (where he spent the most years of his Rotary Service). In June 1997, Don received the Rotary International award of The Sapphire Pin again by the Hurstville Rotary Club. In May 1998 he was awarded Rotary's International 'SERVICE ABOVE SELF' being nominated by the Rotary Club of Canberra. This award being only one of one hundred and forty eight such awards throughout the world in 1998.

Don Woodland has been a Salvation Army officer for more than forty years. In that time he has fulfilled the essential role of chaplain to the police, fire brigade and other emergency services. Whenever Australians have been struck by tragedy, Don Woodland has been there to offer comfort and support. For emergency services personnel whose daily work exposes them to tremendous trauma, Don Woodland is one of the few people who understands the toll their experiences take on them. When tragedy has struck involving loss of life, Don was there to offer solace and support to those left behind.

His memoirs are full of compassion and the deep wisdom gleaned from a lifetime of helping people survive the worst that life can throw at them. Moving, inspiring and uplifting.. his book *Picking Up The Pieces* is about the astonishing strength within us all.

Don and Bernice have 2 daughters and 1 son Judith, Craig and Karen, 2 sons-in-law Stephen & Stuart 4 grandsons, Ryan, Kerrod, Aaron and Thomas and 3 granddaughters, Stephanie, Sophie and Emma.

We are doing a book drive to support the children without school supplies in Papua New Guinea. These books will greatly help them with their education.



# Cistory of Gayundah Wreck

Gayundah.

Who or what is Gayundah? Where is it? And what does it mean?

HMQS (Her Majesty's Queensland Ship) Gayundah is actually a little-known piece of Queensland's naval history. That means she was part of the original Queensland "navy" before the States federated to become Australia. Her task was to protect Queensland from a perceived Russian threat (which never eventuated). She was a flat-iron boat, displacing 360 tons, commissioned by the Queensland Maritime Service in 1884. Gayundah is an Aboriginal word meaning lightning so named because she travelled at a swift 10.5 knots.

She was involved in a supposed mutiny, when one of her guns was aimed at the Queensland Parliament House in 1888. Her Captain Henry Townley-Wright's four-year career in Queensland was marked by several controversies, his excesses and capacity for high living exceeded his salary of £600 a year Captain Wright escalated the situation into a crisis by demanding forward payment of his salary the story goes. The Government refused and instructed him to hand over charge of Gayundah to his first lieutenant, Francis Pringle Taylor.

Wright ignored this demand and placed Taylor under arrest on board the Gayundah and defiantly prepared the Gayundah to sail to Sydney. This act was interpreted as theft and mutiny by the Queensland Government. It was reported that Captain Wright had discussed, with his gunner,

practicalities of aiming Gayundah's guns at Parliament House. He apparently eventually agreed to release Francis Taylor and surrendered himself to the authorities who removed Captain Townley-Wright, RN from the Gayundah. Gayundah was recommissioned in 1898 under the Blue Ensign for the Queensland Government, beginning another chapter in her period of service. This time, Gayundah became the first British warship of the Australian station to successfully operate wireless telegraphy. She was then incorporated into the Commonwealth Naval Forces (forerunner of the Royal Australian Navy) at federation in 1901. She saw service in border protection off the WA coast in 1911.

With the outbreak of World War I, she returned to Moreton Bay for local protection. In 1921, having seen service as a training ship, she was decommissioned and converted to use as a humble gravel barge on the Brisbane River.

In 1958, the hull was sold to Redcliffe, towed to the peninsula and scuttled just off the beach at Scott's Point, an artificial breakwater later extended by the addition of two smaller wrecks. She rests there today, still protecting Australian shores from her

rusty grave.
