



Ian Laurence Scott (1933–2001) was an Australian Rotarian who founded Australian Rotary Health (ARH), a major non-government funder of medical research in Australia. He has an interesting connection to Rotary. Ian Scott was a banker who worked for the then National Bank. Scott joined Rotary in 1973. He served in many Rotary Clubs throughout New South Wales and Victoria. In 1981,

while a member of the Rotary Club of Mornington, Victoria, Scott was moved by the plight of families affected by sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS). To encourage further research on this problem, he proposed that Rotary establish a national research foundation with a corpus of A\$2 million to fund health research, with a focus on family health problems. Rotary accepted this proposal and Scott served as treasurer on the



board of the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund (later called Australian Rotary Health). By 1995, ARH had raised enough money to fund its first grants, which went to research on SIDS. Research supported by ARH led to a major decrease in mortality from SIDS in Australia.

3.30-4.00 Handicap relay finals







#### News Letter No 3

There are only 21 days left to register for the District Conference's Friday night get together or the Saturday Night Gala Dinner or to order any of the catering packages. Registrations for these close Friday 21st March. Don't miss out! Even if you are only planning on attending the business sessions, you will need to register to gain entry to the venue but you may do this up to Friday 28st March.

The previous News Letter gave an outline of the Saturday Morning program but there are many interesting talks and discussions to follow. Professor Lisa Jackson Pulver AM, who is the inaugural Chair of Indigenous Health at UNSW, will talk about her work improving indigenous health. <u>Her Biography</u> is on the District web site.

There will be a discussion topic where all members will have a chance to contribute in groups around the conference tables. The chosen topic is:

"Anecdotally, when potential new members are approached to join Rotary they often decline because of the cost in both time and money. While being asked to pay club dues may seem a significant upfront cost, the ongoing weekly meeting costs are an even greater part of the costs of being a Rotarian. We as Rotarians are in a position to meet these costs but are we excluding people who would be willing serve the community were the cost of doing so within their reach." Is this a fact? And what can clubs do to change meeting formats to reduce costs in time and money?

We shall hear from several clubs in our district who have made changes to their meeting formats and hear how they have benefited or otherwise from the changes. This will be followed by a discussion in table groups followed by a brief report on the group findings.

After lunch we shall hear from Sophie Pieters Hawke who is Alzhelmer's Australia's Young Ambassador. Sophie's Biography is also on our district web site. Sophie is the granddaughter of Hazel Hawke who suffered from Alzhelmer's. Alzhelmer's Australia is the charity that DG Trevor's wife Robyn has chosen to support in this Rotary Year.

One of the best known tourist attractions on the Sunshine Coast would have to be Australia Zoo but not as well known perhaps is the wildlife care and conservation programs that the Irwins undertake. ### New Pacific Islands club in District 9920

When the Rotary Club of Bairiki, Kiribati, was chartered on June 20, 2013, then District Governor Ron Seeto had been working hard to conclude preparations prior to the end of his term. However, communication difficulties with prospective members meant formal chartering came too late for Ron to visit before change overs took place in June-July.

The Rotary Club of Bairiki is not the first on the Pacific Island nation of Kiribati, but it is the first in the country's main population centre. The first club established was on Kiritimati (Christmas) Island in the North East Pacific, which is closer to Honolulu than its own capital, Tarawa. The Kiritimati club was founded by a Rotarian from Hawaii and is still strongly supported by the Hawaiian club today.

Kribati is one of the world's smallest landmass states, covering just 720 square kilometres and spread out across 16 atolls in an ocean area about the size of the US. It is also one of the most fragile in terms of vulnerability to climate change impacts.

The needs of the various island



communities is great and Charter President of the Rotary Club of Bairiki, Kauaba Ibutuna, and his team have their work cut out just prioritising them.

The first project funded by the club was the provision of a scanner printer to Te Toa Matoa (the nation's Disabled Association) to help it organise services to its members.

The Rotary Club of Sydney, NSW, has already arranged a consignment of used books for the library of Betio Junior Secondary School, which previously had no reading material. Other clubs in the Coffs Harbour area in NSW are joining an ambitious plan to help the Rotary. Club of Bairiki raise funds for simple water purifiers to be distributed in primary schools and clinics. Kiribati has no fresh water source other than rain and shallow ground water lenses on the islands. Most wells are now polluted, leading to the spread of disease.

#### **D9600 Interact Conference**

Interactors attending the D9600 District Interact Conference at St Columban's Catholic College in Caboolture Qld were shown how to erect ShelterBox relief tents by District Chair, Greville Easte and Ambassador, Mat Mackenzie. The students then went on to erect 4 tents on their own and discussed ways of raising funds. Many students were impressed with the "Socks 4 Syria" campaign and vowed to take it back to their schools and colleges. #### SHELTERBOX DEPLOYMENTS

#### Philippines - Super Typhoon







Australian SRT members and Rotarians, Gary Bidner and Peter Pearce are the latest Aussies to volunteer in the Philippines. So far, in total, the ShelterBox Response Teams working in the Philippines have distributed shelters to help 5,700 families. NFIs have been distributed as well. Distributions continue across the islands of Panay, Bantayan, Cebu and Leyte, as well as Tacloban in Leyte, the hardest hit area. Surprisingly over 100 days on, there is still a need for emergency shelter due to the scale and complexity of the disaster. More tents, tarps and solar lamps are being sent. So far over 80 SRT members have been deployed.

Bolivia - Floods



Bolivian-based Rotarian, Freddy Mercado contacted Ops as flooding affected thousands in Cochabamba province. The government doesn't want international assistance but is happy to accept help from aid agencies who already have a presence in the country, like Oxfam. ShelterBox has finalised a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Oxfam, who will be distributing our aid on our behalf. 448 ShelterBoxes have been sent from prepositioned stock in Panama.

Syria - Conflict



Two consignments of 200 Alpinter tents and 1,200 thermal blankets have been sent to partner organisations that have a presence inside Syria, who will distribute the aid to Syrian families displaced by the ongoing syria conflict. The team will be heading to the region next week to meet with the partners and verify distributions.

#### Zimbabwe - Floods



ShelterBox responded to flooding in Zimbabwe's Masvingo Province, following unusual heavy rains that have forced over 2,000 families to uproot their homes, taking with them only the few possessions they can carry. A southern African-based Response Team has been working with International Organization for Migration (IOM) to assess the need. For now, there is no need for ShelterBox aid but we will keep in touch with IOM who are leading the shelter response and camp management.
